University of Oregon, Eugene, Dec. 15.—(Special.)—The varsity basketball team will leave on a two-week barnstorming tour through California during the Christmas holidays at the end of this term which is December 18, according to an announcement by Coach Billy Reinhart. The team will return January 4, after playing eight games.

Contests have been definitely scheduled with the University of California (southern branch), Los Angeles Athletic club, San Jose State Teachers college, Redlands university and Loyola college of Los Angeles. Tentative games with St. Mary's, St. Ignace and the Olympic club of San Francisco have been arranged.

The team will witness the east-west football game at Pasadena on Year's day.

GUN CLUB HOLDS ALL DAY SHOOT

Another classified turkey shoot is being held by the Salem Rod and Gun club today on the club grounds on the Turner road. The Rod and Gun club sponsored one of the largest turkey shoots last Sunday.

The shoot Sunday was successful, participants coming from all sections of the country. Of the 76 to 100 birds there were not only turkeys, but geese and capons. Birds lasted until late in the afternoon, with nearly every shooter walking off with at least one bird. The shoots are run on a classified basis with three classes, class A for good shooters; class B for medium shooters and class C for the poor shot.

The club will hold its regular meeting next Thursday night instead of Tuesday as was planned. The meeting will be called at 6:30 at the Spa, where a dinner will be served following the business meeting.

The shoot being held today is run on the same basis as that of Sunday, according to Dr. G. E. Prime, president of the club. The fees for the shoot will be reasonable, so that the birds will be sold at very little or no profit. The birds being shot for will be placed in the cage near the pull station, so that the shooters may see and examine to their own satisfaction, the bird for which they are shooting. The shoot is expected to last all day.

Rail Projects Fail To Meet State Needs Commission Holds

In a brief that has been forwarded to the interstate commerce commission the Oregon public service commission summarizes its contentions relative to railway development in central and eastern Oregon. It is held that the proposals of the several carriers do not fully meet the transportation requirements of the involved territory, and that these requirements cannot be met except by the building of a direct cross-state line and a line running south from Bend to Lakeview, as recommended by Examiner Kephart of the interstate commerce commission.

It is held that the application of the Oregon Trunk for a certificate of public convenience and necessity authorizing the construction of railroads in Deschutes and Klamath counties meets a prime transportation requirement in that it furnishes competitive service to central Oregon, provides a needed route to the markets of the northern states, assists in meeting a fundamental military necessity for a north and south line east of the Cascades and provides a more

evenly balanced competition between transcontinental carriers. In addition to this the commission holds that the Oregon Trunk should also build a line to Silver Lake.

The application of the Central Pacific to build a line from Klamath Falls to Cornell is justified, the brief holds, for the purpose of providing the Tule lake valley with local service, but not as a part of a through line to serve western and central Oregon.

The application of the Oregon, California & Eastern for authority to build a line from Sprague river to Lakeview, should be granted, the commission believes, subject to a reservation of common operating rights by the northern lines. The company's application to build to Silver Lake, with a branch to the Williamson river, should be denied, the brief says, and operating rights being granted the Oregon Trunk to Silver Lake be granted.

The application of the Southern Pacific for authority to acquire control of the Oregon, California

& Eastern, says the brief, should be granted only upon condition that the northern lines are permitted to enter the territory involved, and upon condition of common operating rights being granted the Oregon Trunk and the Union Pacific.

The application of the Southern Pacific for authority to acquire control of the Nevada-California-Oregon line and to standardize that line, should be allowed, says the brief.

The brief concludes by saying that "the Oregon commission desires, however, to emphatically impress upon this record the fact that any order which may be made with respect to any of the involved applications, whether such order

concern the extension of existing lines or the construction of new lines, or concern the acquisition of one or more lines by another carrier, should be so conditioned and safeguarded as to correctly and adequately insure real and active competition between the carriers, and should likewise adequately provide for joint construction and joint use wherever practicable."
