Better Health Longer Life
GORGAS MEMORIAL INSTITUTE

(By Dr. Harry V. Wurdemann of Seattle, Wash., Member of the Gorgas Memorial Institute.) Parents, teachers and students should know more about vision and proper use of the eyes, for the human eye is an imperfect organ which has not yet become adapted to the strenuous demands made by the comparatively sudden development of civilization. Our eyes are working all our waking hours and accommodating themselves to near and distant objects with but little rest.

At least nine out of ten human beings have poorly developed eye balls and need correcting lenses with which to see easily or better. The great business organizations now demand good or corrected eyesight; for better and more work is done and less time is lost by their employees. There are fewer accidents and the dividends are greater. All this is in addition to the comfort and happiness of the individual workman with better vision. Dull children and poor workmen are brought up to standards of the others by attention to and care of the eyes.

Human education and thought is more permanently and quickly accomplished by what is seen. In a twentieth part of a second the whole story of a view, a picture, or an action is told to the brain by the eye. It is not forgotten as is the spoken thought; for the word may pass into one ear and out of the other.
