

COUNCIL GIVES DISPUTED OIL AREA TO BRITISH

Geneva, Dec. 16.—(A. P.)—The Council of the League of Nations, having "regretfully noted the failure of its attempts at mediation" in the disputes over the Mosul region of Iraq between Great Britain and Turkey decided that the rich oil regions shall go to Iraq.

Great Britain already has the mandate over Iraq, and therefore the disputed territory will remain in her hands. It is asserted that the British cabinet has sent assurances to the League council, that Great Britain will accept a prolongation of the Iraq mandate to 25 years. Turkey, it is reported, will receive a narrow strip of the territory lying to the north of Iraq.

The Turks are indignant over the decision of the council. Tewfik Ruzhdi Bey, head of the Turkish delegation here, charges Great Britain with having brought influence to bear on the council in her favor by stating that the Turks had massacred men and women and sold children into slavery. A report from a Chaldean Catholic priest and the British delegation turned it over to the council.

MOORE RESIGNS AS AMBASSADOR

New York, Dec. 16.—(A. P.)—Ambassador Moore has announced to King Alfonso of Spain that he has resigned and will return at once to the United States, a co-registered dispatch from Madrid to the New York Times says today.

State department officials at Washington declined to comment upon the news.

King Alfonso was reported greatly moved by the ambassador's announcement, which was made at a farewell audience at the palace.

"Borden being ambassador, you have always been a friend," he is quoted as saying. "Your kind sympathy and friendly manner have obtained everything for your country. Moreover, you have al-

ways helped us and been a great friend."

Mr. Moore was a personal appointee of President Harding. He followed custom in offering his resignation upon the succession of President Coolidge but was retained.

NORTHWESTERN MILLION DOLLAR SPORT STADIUM

Chicago, Dec. 16.—(A. P.)—Northwestern university has obtained permission from the Evans-ton city council to erect its proposed \$1,000,000 football stadium but the stand will not be the triple-decked 125-foot high structure that it had been planned.

The university had asked for permission to erect the 125-foot high stadium which would have been the highest in the country. But the city council instead passed amendments to the building code permitting a start on the preliminary work on the stands with an 80-foot limit. So instead of a 75,000 capacity oval the concrete stands will seat 50,000 in double decks.

The council's refusal was taken as an echo of the disturbances of several weeks ago when Evans-ton policemen and firemen were man-handled by students who celebrated football successes by burning an abandoned fraternity house and setting fire to the old wooden athletic field stands.

BIG MUNN TO RETURN TO RING IS REPORT

Chicago, Dec. 16.—Big Munn, the Nebraska heavyweight who for a time last winter held the wrestling championship, plans to return to the boxing game, and will meet Andre Anderson at Kansas City soon, it was announced today by Munn's new manager, Ed White of Chicago.

Munn took up wrestling about two years ago after three appearances with the gloves had left him on the losing end. His new pilot intimates that no wrestling offers will be turned down, but in the future it will be boxing matches which have first call.

A special four-round preliminary between Shadow Grete of Salem and Johnny Rose of Portland has been arranged. Grete has been advancing rapidly in the last

few fights and is ready to bowl over another fighter on his upward journey. Rose will be no set-off for the local lad, however, and Grete will have to extend him to get a win. Another four-round curtain raiser has been scheduled by Plant. The fight will start promptly at 8:30.

PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL HIT

New York, Dec. 16.—(A. P.)—The National Collegiate Athletic association meeting in New York December 30, plans a concerted attack on over-emphasis of college football and professional football. A resolution for consideration of the delegates urges that educational institutions be urged to combat tendencies to over-emphasis of professional football. The resolution would limit pre-season training, the number of intercollegiate contests and the number of games played in other than college stadiums. It would abolish athletic scholarships and improper prizefighting and encourage intramural and inter-class football.



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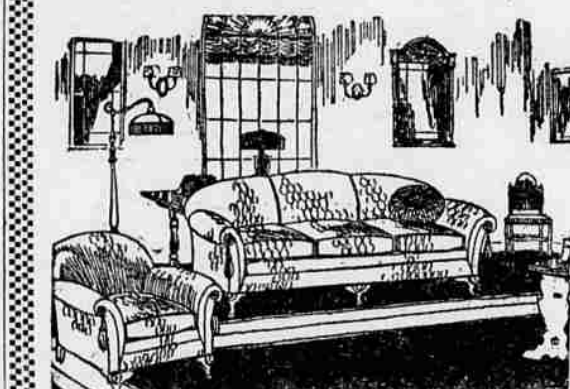
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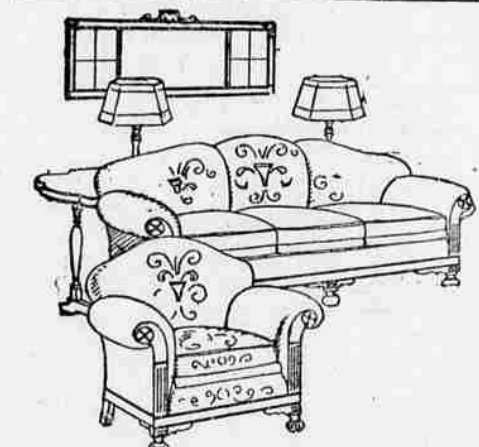


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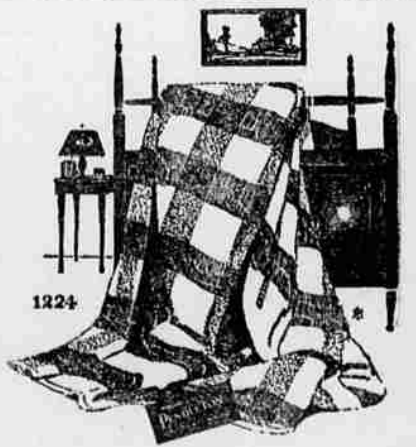
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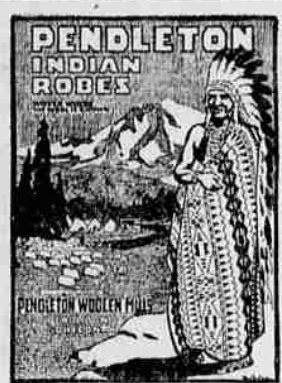
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
