

\$500 FINE AND 9 MONTHS IN JAIL FOR BOOTLEGGER

Refusal by Russell Beckett while on the witness stand to answer a question when ordered by the court to do so added three months to his penalty when sentenced by Justice of the Peace Small yesterday for selling intoxicating liquor. He gets a total of nine months in the county jail and a fine of \$500. He was found guilty at a jury hearing in justice court after the six jurors had deliberated about ten minutes.

In the course of his direct examination Beckett said certain liquor he had handled was not his own, but came from a third person. On cross-examination District Attorney Carson asked him to name the third person. He refused, saying it would discriminate the person.

Carson appealed to the court, the court held it a proper question and ordered Beckett to answer. He refused.

After the verdict of guilty came in Justice of the Peace Small informed Beckett that his sentence on the liquor selling charge would be \$500 fine and six months in jail, and for contempt of court three months additional in jail.

Beckett is said to be a veteran bootlegger but prior to the present case has never been arrested for the offense. He was arrested December 11 through cooperation of the state prohibition department and the Salem police. At the same time Carrol Wright and Deb Day were arrested, Wright for selling and Day for possession. Their hearings have not yet been set. Both are in jail.
