

TELEPHONE LINE CONTROL SOUGHT WOODBURN MEN

Woodburn, Dec. 17.—Negotiations are under way with the Portland representatives of the telephone company whereby 25 farmers' lines running out of Salem may be taken over by a group of farmers who are organizing their own company. John Harnage, chairman of farmers' telephone committee of the Woodburn Community club, reported at the monthly meeting of the organization last night. Assistance to the farmers was pledged by the Community club.

Methods of financing are now being discussed and a meeting with the telephone people is scheduled for next week. It is hoped that the transaction may be completed within the next few weeks.

The 25 lines now have 47 telephones and it is the objective of the proposed new company to increase this number to 150 telephones.

"If we issue bonds there seems to be a question of a guarantee that future councils will not repeat and have more outstanding warrants," declared John P. Hunt, president of the club. "The bond issue cannot expect to be approved by the voters until positive assurance is given that the present situation will not arise again."

The committee is satisfied that the time is ripe for the bond issue but believes it is hardly in its province to recommend any particular type of safe guard for the future though it realizes such is necessary.

Keith Powell told the club members. He suggested the appointment of a representative committee of Woodburn business men, not only from the club but to include non-members, to investigate ways and means of safeguarding the future and to make the necessary recommendations.

Action upon the suggestion, President Harnage appointed a committee of nine with instructions to report at an early date. Members of this committee are George Landon, F. Allen, Charles Simmons, R. Knapp, J. Hall, R. L. Freeberg, Blaine McCord, R. L. Giles and N. L. Scofield.

Blaine McCord, attorney, urged that the committee outline a concrete program before final action be taken by the Community club because of the conditional element contained in the report of the special committee he asked that the report be placed on file.

Tony Becker, garage man, was introduced as a new member and made a short talk. Approximately 80 members of the club attended the dinner, served at 6:30 o'clock.

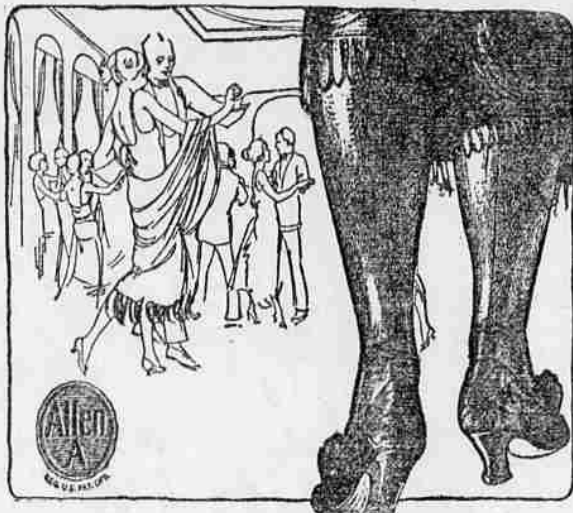
