The accident with which Waldspiel met last night, according to his attorney, will keep him confined for several weeks and will make necessary a further postponement of the hearing.

SHOOTS BRIDE OVER A PUZZLE

New York, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Angered because his bride of 17 months would not help him solve a crossword puzzle, Theodore Koerner, an ardent devotee of the pastime, seriously wounded her and killed himself.

Koerner last night asked Mrs. Koerner for help in solving a particularly difficult combination of letters.

"I have a head ache," she replied. "I think I'll go and lie down."

A moment later as she was in the bedroom of their apartment Koerner appeared at the door with a pistol in his hand. He fired without speaking and the bullet struck Mrs. Koerner in the right temple. As she died Koerner fired another shot at her, which missed its target, and then turned the pistol on himself. He had had two nervous breakdowns since summer and was on sick leave from his work.

that opinion is enforced by the tongue not only against members of the league, but against non-members as well.

The Idaho senator declared that none of the reservations offered in the resolution of adherence changed the situation and were not intended to change it.

"The question here," he said, "is whether this is right, is in the interest of world peace and in the interest of our country."

"If a senator believed this was wrong, but voted for it because a political platform declared for it, he would be the slimmest creature that ever wiggled his way through the United States senate."

Offers Reservations. Senator Borah offered three additional reservations (one would provide that no force or economic sanction shall be used to enforce the decrees of the court. Another would prohibit the court from performing any function except those provided for in the statute creating it.

The third would reaffirm the traditional policy of non-entanglement in foreign politics.

Silverton, Dec. 18.—(Special) Loggers of the Silver Falls Timber company camps came out for the winter months today. The mill will close down for its annual clean-up on December 23 and remain down until January 4th. All departments are closing this week. The fire was extinguished by the Ashland fire department after damage estimated at \$125 had resulted. Mrs. Whesley will be held to the grand jury on a charge of arson. No explanation of her enmity toward Mrs. McCoy was given other than that she did not like the woman.
