STOLEN AUTO CUSHIONS FOUND

Auto cushions stolen a week or so ago from automobile owners in Salem, were located yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Bert Smith in a barn on the Dr. Claggett place on the road between Keizer school and Chemawa, and the cushions brought to the sheriff's office. Three cushions were recovered, a fourth one belonging to Harry Levy not being returned, but Smith made the cushion has been located and will be brought here. The cushions evidently had been used by someone sleeping in the old barn, as they had been arranged as a bed and the place showed signs of occupancy. A man who happened to go into the barn discovered the cushions and reported to the sheriff's office. been laboring to support two younger brothers and keep them in school. Victims of the separation of their parents and a disrupted home the boys have been fighting an uphill battle that at times has seemed almost hopeless. The younger boys are also being outfitted by Santa's volunteers.

Five More Diphtheria

Another call that is demanding the disbursement of a generous slice of the Christmas fund is the case of a widow trying to clothe, feed and educate five small children. By skin-ping and close planning, and the aid of one of the older boys who sold newspapers, she was able to keep the two ends of adverse circumstances from drifting too wide apart. Then one of the little ones came down with diphtheria and quarantine shut off their only means of support. Now all of the children are down with the disease.

Must Feed Hungry

These are a few of the answers that are made by the sponsors of the Christmas Cheer Movement to the queries as to what need inspires its repeated pleas for money and more money. It is not just a problem of providing Christmas toys and trinkets for the children. They also must be clothed and fed where the need for such measures is found. The gift packages, the dinner baskets and the Christmas tree for all the kiddies must be provided, but before that the hunger and cold which gnaws at them daily must be relieved.

interests from the development of the linen industry in Oregon, as announced in The Capital Journal, Wednesday, was by mutual consent, and the materially strengthened the local project," said Mr. Snelling.

"In the first place the size and cost of the plant required was overestimated and during the past year certain improvements have been made in spinning machinery whereby production has been speeded up and costs lessened.

"In the second place, under the original agreement the local plant would have been restricted in its operation to the manufacture of low count crapes, the raw material for which spinning tow is the output to be marketed through a sales organization handling the output of an eastern factory specializing on goods of higher grade. Since spinning tow is a by-product developed in connection with fine fiber, this arrangement would have left the local company with a very large quantity of line fiber on its hands to be sold on the open market.

"Under the plan adopted by the board of directors at its meeting Wednesday the new plant will be complete and so balanced as to utilize all the raw material in its operations and the goods to be manufactured will range from low counts to medium and will include—
