due to the fog, and ran off to the left into the ditch, crashing into a telephone pole. Alaman threw his right arm in front of the woman's face to protect her from flying glass and suffered severe gashes in his arm.

Alaman was taken to a local hospital immediately and a total of some 30 stitches taken at various places in his arm. While being put under the influence of the ether he jumped from the operating table, ran downstairs and jumped through the heavy plate glass window in the door of the main entrance.

After wandering the streets for a short time he was brought back to the hospital. Alaman was resting easily this morning.

U. J. Lehman, father of both Russell and Robert Lehman, this morning would not deny the report that Robert, not Russell, was the driver in Sunday morning's accident. Robert's driver's license was revoked on November 28, records at the office of the secretary of state show. The reason for revoking Robert's license was that he had misrepresented his age as obtaining it, being only 15 years old and claiming to be more than 18.
