VOTE AS YOU DRINK IS URGE

New Haven, Jan. 21.—(A.P.)—If the citizens of the United States would "vote as they drink and drink as they vote" the present prohibition situation would be relieved considerably in the opinion of the United States attorney, Emory R. Buckner of New York, expressed in an interview with the Yale Daily News.

"The great burden today," Mr. Buckner said, "is that people may vote for prohibition, or be in favor of it because they think it will be of benefit to others, but they do not act in its enforcement themselves.

"If the citizens do not like prohibition, they should not privately criticize or covertly seek to hamstring law enforcement. They should like true Americans, come out in the open and fight for the repeal of the eighteenth amendment or its modification."

CHICAGO SLAYER NABBED, ST. LOUIS

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 21.—Martin Durkin, Chicago murderer, sought in a nation-wide search, was arrested by department of justice agents here yesterday upon his arrival from San Antonio.

Durkin admitted his identity. Two revolvers were found in his train drawing room. He was accompanied by a woman.

Durkin, who is wanted for the murders of a policeman and a civilian, was overpowered before he could make use of his revolver. His identity was made virtually certain by comparison with photographs and descriptions.

The woman arrested with him, an attractive blonde, at first said she was Miss Irma Sullivan, 18, of Cornell, Ill., but later said she had married Durkin in East St. Louis two weeks ago, Durkin giving the name of Durkey.
