3 LIVES LOST IN STORM IN SOUTH

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 13.—(AP)—Deaths resulting from the storm of wind, rain and accompanying high tides which have swept all of southern California for the past three days, had amounted to three today, with the amount of damage increasing hourly as additional reports were received.

The encroaching waves along the Santa Monica bay swept ten more beach cottages into the sea and the breakers were strewn with pieces of furniture. Near Santa Monica the water flowed into the beach club, a fashionable resort and stood two feet deep on the ball room floor. Cement swimming pool at the residence of Thomas Bundy, tennis player, were undermined and torn out by the breakers. Several launches were torn from the moorings and thrown up on the beach at Venice.

A squad of deputy sheriffs was rushed to the affected areas on Santa Monica bay on receipt of reports that vandalism was in progress among vacated beach cabins and homes.

ACT TO RESUME MINING AT ONCE

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 13.—(AP)—Steps toward quick production of anthracite were being taken today in the 500 square miles of territory comprising the Pennsylvania hard coal field.

The agreement reached yesterday between the miners and operators representatives, ending the strike, which had kept 150,000 miners in idleness since September 1, is to be ratified by a tri-district convention of miners in Scranton next Tuesday.

Most of the mines will be in operation a few days later. The peak production might not be reached for some time, as many miners have left the region to obtain employment elsewhere.

The Scotch Valley mine of the Beaver Valley Coal company probably will be the first colliery to resume actual production. This mine, located in Beaver township, Columbia county, is starting operations with its full force of 150 men today.

25 CARS BROCCOLI SHIPPED TO DATE

Roseburg, Ore., Feb. 13.—(AP)—Twenty-five carloads of broccoli had been moved from Douglas county up to this morning. Seven are being loaded today, two at Riddle and five at Roseburg. The two loaded at Riddle today were the first from the south end of the county, all of the 25 previously shipped having been sent out from Roseburg.

Up to the present time the crop has been bringing from \$1.25 to \$1.45 per crate, shippers state. A message received from Chicago today states that the superior quality of the Oregon crop is making California cauliflower hard to sell and that as a result a cut in price on cauliflower is anticipated, which will force broccoli down.

HAROLD LLOYD SUED FOR \$250,000 DAMAGES

New York, Feb. 13.—(AP)—Owen Davis, playwright, filed suit today in the supreme court for \$250,000 damages against Harold Lloyd, film comedian, alleging that Lloyd pirated his play "The Nervous Wreck" and made it into a movie called "Why Worry."

Hal Roach and Fred Neumeyer, both movie men and the Pathe distributing corporation of New York were named co-defendants.

ALLEGED SLAYER IS FREED

Toledo, Ore., Feb. 12.—(AP)—A jury late yesterday returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of Harry Boersig, on the charge of man slaughter. Boersig was indicted because of the killing of S. S. Henkle of Corvallis, while the two were deer hunting last fall in the Yachats country. Testimony brought out that Henkle, before he died, exonerated Boersig of any blame. Boersig shot at moving brush, thinking that a deer was his target.

Legion Lays Plans To Extend Service At Dallas Session

Dallas, Or., Feb. 13.—The problem of bringing the American Legion in Oregon into greater service to the ex-service men of the state, and to the communities served by the Legion was discussed Friday afternoon and evening by state leaders and post representatives at the district convention of five Oregon counties held here. Only four posts in Marion, Linn, Benton, Lincoln and Polk counties were not represented at the session.

Increased membership was one of the most important subjects discussed and post representatives indicated that at least 1000 more members can be expected from the district yet this year. The dormancy of the Woodburn post came up for discussion and it was indicated that the state department will probably cancel the charter and turn the territory over to the live Silverton and Salem posts.

Ben Fisher of Marshfield brought assurance to the district that Coos Bay is preparing to entertain the 1926 convention, August 5, 6, 7, in royal shape. The posts of Marshfield and North Bend, joint hosts, are prepared to spend \$5000 to \$10,000 in entertaining the convention and promise real hospitalities for both the Legion and auxiliary members. Mr. Fisher declared. Division and regimental reunions, a visit of the Pacific fleet and many other features are in prospect.

AVIATOR OFF TO EXPLORE ARCTIC POLAR REGIONS

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 13.—(AP)—With the sailing of the S. S. Victoria, a new aerial adventure in the Arctic starts on its way to Alaska today.

Captain George Hubert Wilkins, youthful Australian aviator-explorer, heads the expedition with plans to fly March 21 from Point Barrow, the farthest north projection of Alaska, into the unexplored reaches of the Polar sea in search of a new continent. Major Thomas G. Langhelfer, assigned as an observer from the army air service, will claim for the United States any land that may be found.

Two monoplane, one powered by three engines and the other by a single one, are lashed aboard the Victoria, and will be assembled at Fairbanks, at the end of the government railroad in the interior of Alaska, and flown toward the northern coast base at Point Barrow. The supplies are to be assembled for exploration flights over the Arctic ocean between Alaska and the North pole, a region heretofore inaccessible to explorers. After several flights, a hop from Point Barrow to Spitzbergen, on the other side of the world, more than two thousand miles, is to be attempted.

The route of this flight passes within a hundred miles of the North pole. In a few days later, a national reputation taking the place of Lincoln Beachey on the program of the Panama-Pacific exposition in which Beachey was killed.

ANTI-SALOON PROBE SOUGHT

Washington, Feb. 13.—(AP)—Investigation of the Anti-Saloon League by a special congressional committee was proposed today in a resolution introduced by Representative Britton, republican, Illinois, who charged the organization with exercising influences on the internal revenue bureau and with other improper practices.

Prefaced by nine declarations, the resolution said the inquiry was requested because the league has attempted to influence federal judicial appointments, has publicly renounced judicial officers and divisions, has attempted to influence the president in appointment of his cabinet and has "actually exercised its invidious influence successfully upon the bureau of internal revenue to the extent that appointments under the prohibition commissioner have been made only with the sanction and approval of the league."

Henry Holt Dead New York, Feb. 13.—(AP)—Henry Holt, author-publisher, died today at his home in this city. Death resulted from complications of bronchitis. He was 86 years old.
