Seattle Girl Weds Salem Man

The wedding in Seattle on Wednesday evening of Miss Helen Jordan and Charles Waters Craig is particularly interesting in Salem, uniting as it did, the daughter of a former Salem girl and a Salem man well known here and a member of a pioneer family.

The following account of the ceremony appeared in yesterday's Seattle Post Intelligence:

"At one of the prettiest home weddings of the season Miss Helen Jordan, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Morrell Jordan, last night married Mr. Charles Waters Craig of Salem, Ore., son of Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Craig of Salem. The Rev. Dr. John D. McClellan performed the ceremony at 8:30 o'clock.

"The service was read before the fireplace, which was screened with ferns and zinnias in pink and mauve shades. Tall cathedral tapers were at either side, and the aisle was lined with standards of zinnias and marked with ribbons.

"The bride, entering with her father, was a winsome figure in a bouffant model of pale pink tulle over silver cloth, the cloudy veil of pink tulle being held with a cap bound with orange blossoms. Her bouquet was an old fashioned one of baby's breath and valley lilies.

"Miss Elizabeth Ward of Portland, the bride's cousin and only attendant, wore orchid tulle over silver, also fashioned with tight bodice and full skirt. Her flowers were Columbia roses, lace flowers and water lilies. Mr. Frederick Richards of Seattle was best man.

"Before the ceremony Mr. William Peabody sang 'Ave Marie' and Mrs. Charles Edward Miller played the wedding march. At the reception Mrs. Edward H. Stuart, Mrs. George D. Ward, Mrs. Benjamin Armstrong, Miss Beverly Butler, Mrs. Frederick W. Hopkins, Mrs. Miller and Miss Ruth Bamford assisted.

"For her going away costume Mrs. Craig wore a Chanel model of gray, with a coat of navy blue and gray check collar with fox. Her hat was a navy blue ribbon one trimmed with an ostrich brush on one side, and her flowers brushed Mr. and Mrs. Craig will be at home in Salem after October 1."
