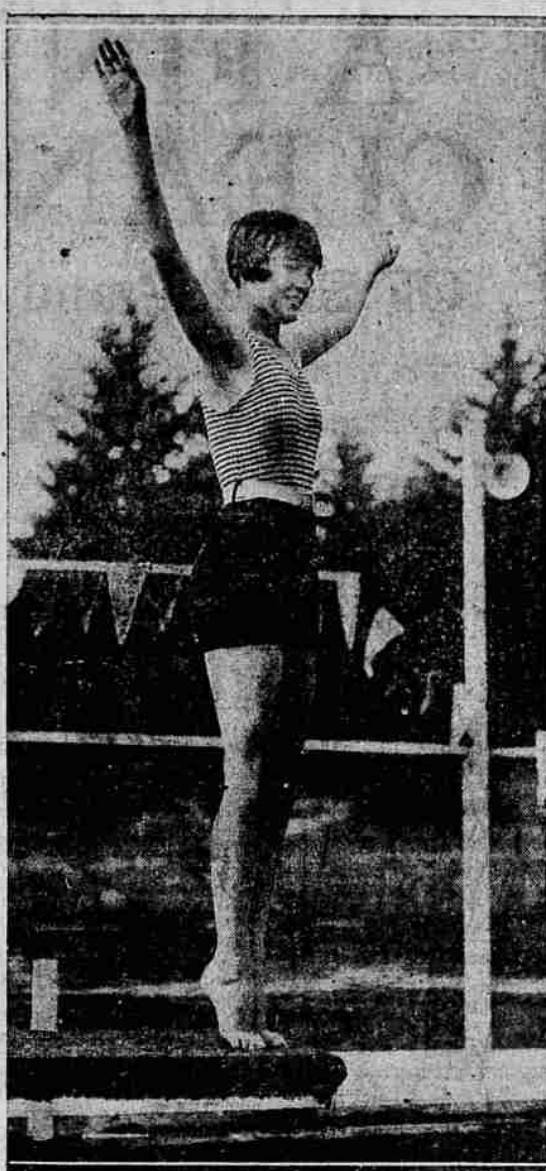

BURTON LEADS SENATOR NINE WITH THE BAT

Jimmy Burton, Salem outfielder and catcher, has jumped into the lead for the batting honors for the Salem Senators in the latest compilation of figures, which include all of the games played this season, except the Seattle game and the two Kelso games at Kelso.

Burton supplants Quinn, who, on the last time of compiling the figures, was in the lead with a total of 871. Quinn has made but four hits in the last four games and has slumped to 348. However, the general trend of the whole team is on the upward path and from a glance it may be seen that the locals will be out with plenty of wood to greet the Harrisburg team here Sunday.

Harrisburg has an enviable record so far this season and won the upper Willamette valley title. A good array of material is lined up here Sunday against the Senators and from all indications the game will be fast and bitterly fought.

The team average has gone from below the 300-mark to well over it, the whole team seeming to have found its stride in the last few games. With this bright prospect the locals will probably be out with vim for the remainder of the season. Last time the cherry city team was batting .283. Now the team average is rated at .324, and the fielding average has also experienced a slough for the better.

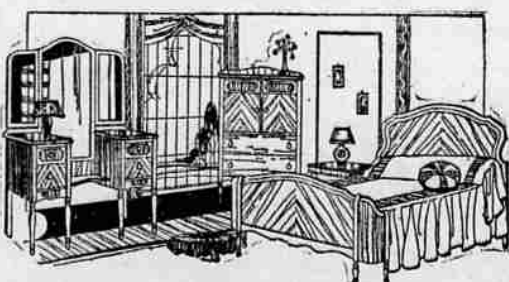
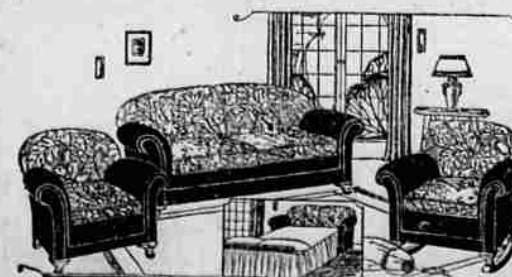
