The river steamer Northwestern will be sent up the Willamette river from Portland in the near future, probably either this coming Sunday or the following Sunday, it was announced this morning by F. W. Karr, head of the Salem Navigation company. The boat is now within one inch of its original draft when first built. It draws 17 inches of water fore and aft, and 19 inches of water in the center. Before being repaired and remodeled it drew 28 inches of water; all measurements being of the craft without any cargo. Approximately \$7500 has been spent repairing and reconditioning the steamer, according to Mr. Karr. The charges at the dry dock reached a total of \$500. The sum of \$1000 was spent repairing and improving the engines, and other expenses amounted to about \$1500 more.

## LIONS' LINEAGE TRACED BACK 2000 YEARS

Speeches by Bob Hotchkisson, district governor of the Lions, by Rev. Stauffer, chaplain of the Lions club at Petaluma, Cal., by Vice President Herman of the club at Boulder, Cal., and by Arthur Brookwell, representative of the international Lions headquarters, made speeches before the Salem Lions club at its luncheon at the Marion hotel this noon.

Mr. Brookwell is in Oregon as an organizer of Lions clubs in this district. "Statisticians are rather more than overly fond of telling us," he said, "that the idea of service clubs is something that has originated within the last 15 or 25 years. As a matter of fact the motive behind it all originated more than 2000 years ago, when a common man stepped out from the ranks of the people with a new doctrine of life."

Plans for the future of Lions clubs in Oregon were outlined by Mr. Hotchkisson, who is a resident of Portland, and was recently elected district governor to succeed Frank Near of this city. His intention is to organize a number of new clubs, to strengthen those existing at present, and to develop closer relationship between the clubs, he stated.

Mr. Herman and Rev. Stauffer spoke briefly of their respective clubs.

(Continued from Page One) ed under William P. McCracken, Jr., the new assistant secretary of commerce in charge of civil navigation, he emphasized, will be of first importance in building up an air reserve for the national defense.

A number of other commercial air routes are under consideration, but before they can definitely be determined further study will be required.

Another route would take in the Pacific coast, running from southern California to northern Washington state.

A branch of the transcontinental route is also under consideration from Salt Lake City to Portland, Seattle and Tacoma.

Yet another route is contemplated for the Great Lakes area, thru a branch line running from the transcontinental at Cleveland to Chicago by way of Detroit, while a route for the northwestern states is under consideration to start from Chicago and take in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

A Minneapolis air line is under study to run from Chicago by way of St. Louis to New Orleans.

## 7 YEAR OLD BOY LOST IN THE WILDS

Portland, Or., Aug. 13.—(AP)—Porter rangers from the Zig-Zag ranger station, reinforced by parties making up the summer colony at Brightwood, 35 miles from Portland, were scouring the rugged country around Paradise park today in search of little Jackie Strong, 7-year-old son of H. W. Strong, berry grower of Gresham, Or.

Alarm was first sounded late yesterday when the boy failed to return from a fishing trip down Zig-Zag. Summer residents at Brightwood were notified and an unorganized search made by lanterns without any trace being found. The vigil was kept up throughout the night and early this morning the forest rangers were notified.
