

OPPOSITION NOTE IS SOUNDED AT FALLS CITY ROAD HEARING

TIMBER OWNERS PROTEST PLANS OF PROPONENTS

Dallas, Or., Sept. 13.—The first round in the Falls City-Siletz-Newport super-road district project was fought Saturday at Falls City in a hearing before the state highway commission on the merits of the project. The decision of the commission, of which Commissioners Doby and Malone were in attendance, will probably be withheld until its next regular meeting.

Unexpected opposition developed on the outset, with the Lincoln county court and citizens of road district 15, Lincoln county, entering the hearing as absolutely opposed to the inclusion of Lincoln county territory in the boundaries of the project. This with the expected opposition of the timber interests and the farmers of the southeast part of the Polk county territory made heavy going for the proponents of the proposition.

A. A. Muck, Falls City merchant, sketched the purpose of the proposed road, stating that it would establish an outlet for 145 families living in the rock crevices of Lincoln county, and that the same territory should have 1500 families—something which he contended the road would help bring about.

Jay Dunn, commissioner of Lincoln county, summarized the opposition to the project from the county.

The proposed district, which embraced over \$2,000,000 in real property assessed valuation in Lincoln county, included but a small portion of the proposed route in the boundary district. Lincoln county was already built on the route to one mile of the Polk line and the super-road district would place the Lincoln county money at the disposal of the district to build a route lying almost wholly in Polk county. In addition the building of the road would throw a burden of at least \$10,000 per year maintenance on Lincoln county from the boundary of the super-road district to the connection with the main Newport highway near Toledo. All of the rock creek district lies outside the boundary, he declared. The only possible proposition that Lincoln county would accede to would be extending the district clear to Newport, Mr. Dunn stated.

Judge James of Lincoln county stated that the county court had found the sentiment in the county unfavorable to participation of the county in the super-road district. It would mean giving Lincoln county a ratio of one mile of super-road district to 20 for Polk and the benefit was not proportionate to the cost. There was no disposition, according to both Judge James and Mr. Dunn, to oppose the road if Polk cared to build it, and Lincoln would complete to the county line next year.

Written protests were filed on behalf of the Willamette Valley Lumber company and the Coburn-Mitchell interests. The two companies had approximately \$1,000,000 in assessed valuation within the district. The protests developed the idea that the land through which the highway would proceed would not be benefited by the road as it was essentially non-agricultural in character; that the logging operations would proceed entirely independent of the highway, and that no direct benefit would accrue to the holdings of the concerns due to building the highway, and that there were practically no sections to be served within the limits of the district.

These points were further developed by Oscar Hayer, representing the Willamette Valley Lumber company; George Gerlinger, manager of the company, and G. L. Harr, attorney for the Coburn-Mitchell interests.

Proponents of the road brought out the comparative shortness of the proposed route which would place Newport close to Portland as Seaside now is and would probably carry the bulk of the traffic to Newport from all points north of the Salem-Dallas highway. Several ranchers residing within the district spoke in favor of the road.

The route of the proposed road would follow the present road, with the exception of improvements that a new survey might bring out, according to Mr. Muck. The expected cost was placed at by Mr. Muck at \$300,000. This figure was declared too low by Mr. Gerlinger, who said it would be nearer \$500,000.

While the hearing developed some tilts and at times strayed from the subject in hand, it was not torn by ill feeling. There was occasional applause from one side or the other.

It was apparent that the ground work had not been as thoroughly laid as at the Grand Ronde hearing, and the opposition was much stronger. In the former case the Lincoln court had fought for the project.

HUGE BIRDS IN WINTER QUARTER

Their main food is ground alfalfa and rolled barley of which they each consume about 20 pounds a day. The male weighs 320 pounds and the female 350. The feathers of the male are worth from \$85 up. In the raw state, Martha has already laid 24 eggs this season of an average weight of 3 pounds, 4 ounces and expects to lay more.
