SMALL ISLAND HAS COLORFUL TITLE RECORD

Apa, Samoa, Sept. 7.—(A)—Congressional action annexing Swain's Island, a three mile long speck in the ocean 250 miles from here, to American Samoa has brought up in the high court here an old suit to determine its ownership.

Eighty years ago the coral atoll bore a few coconut palms. About that time it was settled upon by Eula Tyrell, a Frenchman, who built houses and established a boiling down station for rendering copra into oil. Tyrell married a Tokelau woman.

In 1856 Tyrell and his wife went to other islands to buy coconuts, leaving behind an eight year old son.

During their absence, Eli Jennings, an American citizen, with two other white men and some islanders landed on the opposite side of the mile lagoon from Tyrell's settlement.

The native in charge sent the boy, Kalofa, across in a boat as evidence that the island belonged to a white man. Jennings, however, insisted upon erecting buildings and informed the natives that Kalofa would be adopted by him as his son. When Jennings' daughter attained marriageable age she was wedded to Kalofa.

Title to the island and its now fruitful coconut groves passed

from Jennings and his companions into other hands, but the descendants of Kalofa and Jennings' daughter have always asserted that their title descending from Kalofa is older than that derived from Jennings.

An effort was made 25 years ago to quiet the title in the supreme court established under the three power government of Samoa, but difficulties arose as to jurisdiction.

The Frenchman, Tyrell, it was afterward learned, had been murdered on another island, to which he had gone for coconuts.

General improvements on electric ranges have created a heavy demand for this style of kitchen cooking equipment.

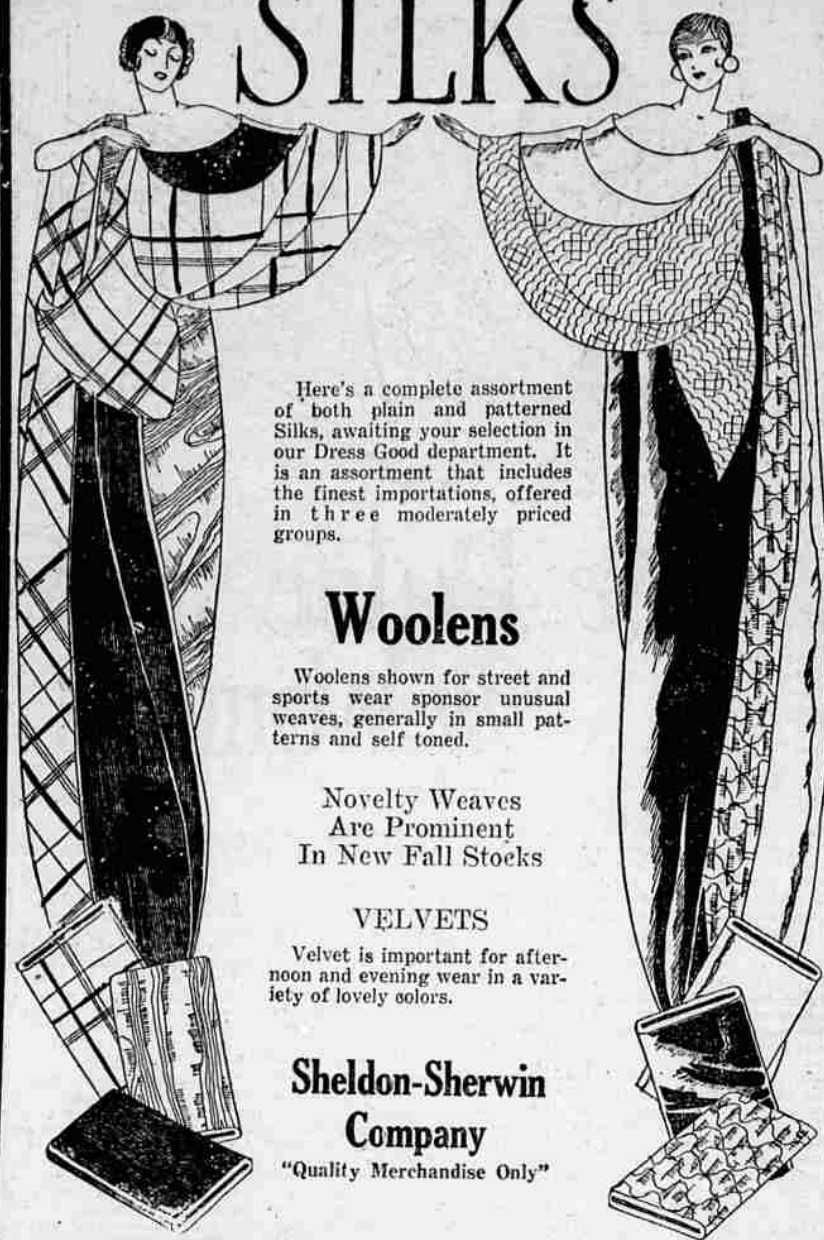
TABLE SERVICE TO BE DISPLAYED
