The season offers so many novelties in footwear, that the most fastidious will find something to her liking. For sports wear, the ever popular oxford and one strap models, in variations are shown. The heels, of course, are low and suitable for walking. The oxfords are made of calfskin and combinations of calf and suede, alligator, calf skin and cobra, and can be had in gray, brown, fawn, beige and combinations, also black.

Plenty of Variety
A larger variety of styles, colors and combinations are found in the afternoon and dress models. Black patent leather, or patent leather with combinations being the favorite. The patent leather opera pump, with either the walking or spike heel, is worn with or without a cut steel buckle. Signs on sides and front. They lace. Other patent leather models made with the ankle strap, have trimmings of kid or suede in contrasting color. Sometimes the heels of these slippers are in the same coloring as the trimmings.

Some of the smartest models are made in variations of the oxford and with very few exceptions, they have the high spike heel, are tongueless and have cut out details with wide silk laces, to the ends of which are attached metallic bead like ornaments.

Oxfords come in patent leather and combinations of alligator, cobra, kidskin. All shades of brown and tan play a large part in fall footwear. Plain black, satin or moire opera or one strap pumps are worn with satin or moire afternoon gowns.

Fashion's Fancy Runs Wild
For evening wear Dame Fashion has allowed her fancy to run wild. Many interesting models are displayed. Some of the favorites are made of plain velvet, have one strap, and gold or silver heels. Other velvet slippers, have contrasting pieces of colored leather applied effect.

Some of the satin slippers are embroidered in the most delicate coloring, while others have rhinestone heels and trimmings. There are opera and strap models of silver and gold kidskin, with the high spike heels, having tiny mirrors in them. Some of these slippers have rhinestones and colored jeweled buckles. Metallic brocade slippers, too, are made in similar styles.

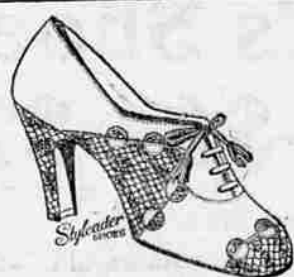

Man is getting just as gay and flamboyant in his desire for radiance in his attire as his sister. If you don't think so just roam around a bit among the shelves and counters and display windows of your favorite haberdasher.

Take a look at the neckwear, the shirts, the hosiery, the handkerchiefs—yes even the garters and the pajamas and you'll find yourself dazzled—but delighted.

Yes "he-male" fashion has gone in for brilliance, but beauty, loudness that's likeable. And why not? Fashion is the art of adornment. Take away the subterfuge of apparel being but a matter of body-covering and you have underlying it all, man's vanity and the effort to make himself as attractive as possible to the opposite sex. And if Fashion is to remain an art it must employ all of Nature's elements of coloring and symmetry to remain so.

For instance Neckwear Never has the neckwear of mankind taken on such brilliant hues

and such exotic designing as is prescribed for this season. Not even in the days of the gay Louis' of France and the Cavaliers of the Middle ages have been indulged in more riotous display of color as is reflected in the neckwear color schemes of today.

Bright colors are the go and these enhanced by rather wild patterns surely make the man's cravat an outstanding feature of his attire. The finest lustrous silks and satins are employed as foundations for these ties.

Charvet, mogador and repps. Conventional figures, floral effects and the bolder ideas in stripes and blocks all add their color or decorative motifs too varied and diversified to detail. You'll have to see them—and hear them.

Shirts Are Boldly Patterned

Patterned shirts are the vogue and these largely have collars to match. In other days of more sedate dressing when shirts were accompanied with the patterned collar at all the pattern was usually a fine stripe or a modest dot.

Collegiate-Shaped Collars Madras and percale cloths lead the fiber and mercerized fabrics largely because they lend themselves better to the stiffened collar.

The collar of the season is the "varsity," or collegiate shape with rather deep tabs and a narrower "V" than we have seen recently. The French cuffs has come back almost to the exclusion of the barrel shape cuff.

Next to these patterned shirts come the plain whites and plain color tints. The tints are mostly in pastel shades of soft greys, tans, hellos, mauves, violets and such delicate tones. These are in soft fabrics with soft matched collars and are largely broadcloths and similar lustrous finishes.

Quieter patterned shirts are in poplins. These are very smart and come only in the more expensive lines. In such shirts the patterns are daintier—neat stripes and the colors are soft and almost always confined to two tones. Flannels show a fair amount of strength.

Young Man's Hosiery Shows Not all men go in for loud hosiery but almost all the young do. The young fellows nowadays wear low shoes the year 'round, therefore, want noticeable hosiery.

The sockless collegiate is passe and the college fellow has gone to the other extreme of wearing gaudiest hosiery. Such hose are in prominent blocks, plaids, bold stripes, diamond effects, herringbone treatments and "what have

you." The weaves are mostly worsteds, cashmere and wool mixtures. Some Plaids Are Modest

A trifle quieter in their tones are the plaids and silks and silk mixtures. This class of hosiery goes in for the more modest plaids and stripes. Some are accordion effects, some have contrasting checks. The embroidered socks and drop stitch treatments are not so much used. Plain colored socks are always the reliance of the conservative dresser and in the final analysis the conservative dresser is in the majority, but he is not the style adherent hence his taste and his purchases while in the majority, do not make food or fabric for a fashion article. If you belong to that class there are oodles of plain blacks, browns, greys, and tans to be found in plaids, mixtures, wools and cottons as well as fine silks.

The Minor Accessories Handkerchiefs, the dress kind, that peak out of your breast pockets are either colored silks or fancy bordered linens. For personal use the conventional whites are still in order.

Gloves show but little that's new. Buck, chamols, pigskin, mocha and cape in the usual colors. The snap fasteners are used much more than the button variety.

Long Points the Vogue Long pointed collars are the vogue. Plain effects are more popular than the self-patterned piques and wale effects. Semi-stiff and white are proper and most popular. For evening dress either the wing or the turn-down. The former leads for formal dress.

Pajamas are gay in pattern and color treatment. New ideas are the knee length coat and the one-piece garment. As yet these are novelties and the military model still remains the most popular.

Belts are a trifle less wide than last year. Buckles are becoming more and more ornate and unique.
