

ATTACHMENT FOR DEMPSEY'S SHARE ISSUED

Philadelphia, Sept. 21.—(AP)—An attachment for Jack Dempsey's share of the purse when he fights Gene Tunney Thursday night was issued in common pleas court today at the request of counsel for Jack Kearns, Dempsey's former manager.

Tex Rickard was named as garnishee and the bail to secure Dempsey's assets was fixed at \$500,000.

Kearns is suing for money alleged to be due him under the terms of his former contract with the heavyweight champion, covering the last three years.

Granting of the attachment, which came as a surprise move, took place in common pleas court No. 5, while Rickard's attorneys were arguing in common pleas court No. 4 against the issuance of an injunction restraining Rickard from paying Dempsey and Tunney any money in advance of the fight in violation of the Pennsylvania law. This action was started last week by a "taxpayer and ticket holder," representing Kearns.

TUNNEY SURE OF SUCCESS

Stroudsburg, Pa., Sept. 21.—(AP)—Gene Tunney thinks only one stands between him and his ambition of five years. The expert has brought on a majority report favoring his opponent, but Tunney makes no secret of the fact that he thinks little, if anything, of expert testimony.

Personal training has ended for the challenger. He did some boxing yesterday that caused ringiders to sit up and take notice. He smashed punches home through openings barely visible to the naked eye.

SAYS TORNADO DUE TO METEOR

London, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The Daily Mail displays today on its front page a letter signed under the pseudonym "Anplian Way" attributing the Florida hurricane to the fall of a meteor, which was seen in England last Friday night, into the sea between Florida and the Bahama islands.

The writer, who dates his letter from a house which in the residence of Captain Roger Mowbray Bellairs, naval assistant to the first sea lord of the admiralty and claims he has studied the causes of hurricanes, tidal waves and meteors, does not submit his view as mere theory, but boldly contends that "there is no question about the accuracy" of his explanation.

NEW YORK FOSTERS ITALIAN CULTURE

New York.—A bit of old Italy, as pure in form as a Medici palace, soon will stand at the crest of Morningdale Heights.

Court House Happenings

Rural School Supervisor Fox has received advices from J. E. Calavan, field worker for boys' and girls' clubs, that free days for boy and girl exhibitors at the state fair this year will be on Monday and Tuesday, rather than on Wednesday and Thursday, as in the past. The reason for the change is that it was believed the boys and girls would go more out of the fair to attend 60 days when the attendance was smaller than on the two days of the fair when the attendance is at its height.

TO BAR PUPILS UNDER 8 YEARS

County Superintendent Folkerson has announced that in all districts of the second and third classes in the county a rule will be strictly adhered to this year that children under six years of age will not be allowed to enter school. However, if children will become six years of age before February 1, they will be permitted, and even urged to enter school now in those districts, as only one class of beginners will be organized during the year and if they wish to go in they must go in now, providing they are to be six before February 1. Otherwise no children under six years of age will be permitted to start to school.

Last year numerous complaints were received from all over the county that teachers were spending their time on pupils under six years to the detriment of other children and as a result the county superintendent decided to rigidly enforce the statute which prohibits children under six years starting to school.

ASTRID TO WED PRINCE LEOPOLD

Brussels, Belgium, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The engagement of Crown Prince Leopold, 24 year old Belgian heir-apparent, to Princess Astrid of Sweden, 20, third daughter of the Duke of Vastergoetland and niece of King Gustav, was officially announced today.

"Their marriage is entirely one of inclination," King Albert told a press delegation in announcing the news. Queen Elizabeth nodded approval of her husband's words.

"The prince and the princess," he continued, "met several times before her visit last month to Clermont castle. They are acting in complete liberty and independence, making their decision without interference from anybody."

FIRE OPENED ON HOTEL FROM EIGHT AUTOS

Chicago, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The advent of a new area in gangster warfare was marked today in Cicero, where a broadside of rapid fire from a cavalcade of eight motor cars outmaneuvered the suburb's previous volleys from pistols and a lone machine gun.

At least two persons were wounded by the fusillade, which raked the Anton hotel and the Hawthorne Inn, a short distance from where Assistant State's Attorney McSwiggin and two companions were slain in April by machine gun fire.

Police sought two other reported casualties in an effort to determine the motive of the bold sortie, which instantly cleared the street of pedestrians and emptied nearby shops.

A witness said the wounded or dead bodies of two persons were dragged onto one of the automobiles while a machine gunner knelt on the sidewalk and spread a covering fan of bullets.

One who fled with the opening shots yesterday was Al "Sacrifice" Chapone, one time vice lord of the suburb, who recently gave himself up and was released in connection with the McSwiggin murder. He was dining in the Hawthorne Inn, his reputed headquarters and found hasty exit through a rear door.

From information through underworld channels, detectives advanced the theory Chapone was the objective of bullets fired by rival bootlegger gangsters by way of warning him against efforts to retrieve his former prestige in the traffic. Chapone was seated in the Hawthorne lobby.

The known victims of the gunfire were Mrs. E. C. Freeman, of Many, La., and Louis Burko.

COUP D'ETAT FEARED IN SPAIN

London, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Cerbere, France, says he learns from Barcelona, Spain, that all posts of the civil guards in Barcelona and suburbs have been doubled and that provincial army garrisons have been placed under the supervision of the civil guards. He adds that the provincial governor is strongly guarded and that a coup d'etat is feared.

According to the correspondent, Catalonia is in ferment. A decree suppressing civil liberty has aroused widespread indignation. General Barrera has been sent to restore order.

'CHILDREN'S CORNER' MONUMENT TO BABY

Chicago.—Thousands of people who daily pass by a few squares away know nothing about the "Children's Corner" of Chicago, or the story connected with its founding. The place at Pullerton Avenue and Orchard Street just west of Lincoln Park.

Almost the first thing that catches attention in the neighborhood is a "Bambino" above a doorway, the quaint blue and white enamel figure of a baby that Della Robbia, centuries back, made the world wide symbol for childhood. The "Bambino" signifies in this case a Chicago children's hospital, and likewise that within half a mile radius a large group of other child hood charities have arisen, besides the Hans Christian Anderson statue and a monument to Eugene Field, the poet of "Little Boy Blue."

Madame Fallieres sent no reply from her country retreat in Loupillon.

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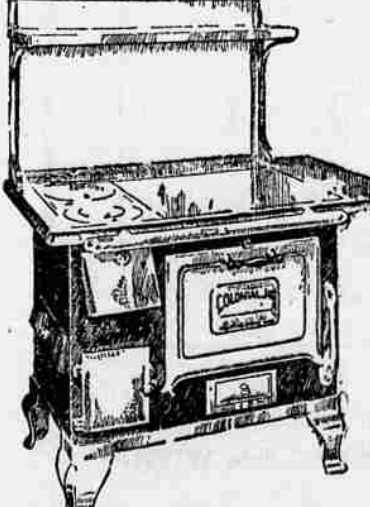


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
