

## CODIFICATION OF ALL TRAFFIC RULES ORDERED

Codification of all the city's traffic ordinances is provided for in a resolution introduced at the meeting of the city council last night, which was adopted. The resolution provides for the appointment of a special committee to take up the subject. The committee has not yet been appointed by the mayor.

A special committee composed of Aldermen Dancy, Purcell and Simons was appointed last night to confer with the state fair board concerning the opening of 17th street and relative to the city dump question. The dump is in close proximity to the fair grounds.

Because of a shortage of funds the sewer committee last night recommended a postponement of action on a petition for a sewer in block 1 of Burlington addition.

The council was not entirely satisfied as to the motive behind a proffer from H. A. Harris, T. M. Hicks, Henry E. Moore and others of a deed to lot 3, block 4 of High way addition for street and highway purposes, and instead of accepting the deed the council referred it to the city attorney for investigation. An ordinance covering the proposal was introduced.

Chief of Police Minto was given authority to put on three special policemen during state fair week. Alderman Galloway called attention to the fact that trucks used in construction of the new line mills are bogging down at the Southern Pacific crossing on Madison street, due to wet ground, and urged that the city hurry with its part of the grade crossing construction at that place. The city is to build up to the ties on each side of the track. Street Commissioner Low said the graders would be at work there this week.

The following bills passed last night:

Separate ordinances assessing the cost of improving the following streets North Liberty from Norway to Jefferson, \$14,746.47; North 16th from A to D, \$8,207.20; North Liberty from Hood to Norway, \$4,591.09; North Fourth from Norway to Columbia, \$12,278.40; Broadway from Columbia to Highland, \$1,289.96; A from 17th to 16th, \$1,778.52; 24th from Richmond avenue to Oak, \$3,871.30; North 19th from Garden road to D, \$13,628.23; Richmond avenue from 4 to block 4 to Oak, \$1,871.46.

An amendment to the garbage ordinance requiring applicants for garbage hauling licenses to make application to the council instead of the city treasurer.

Prohibiting no parking signs except on permission from the council. Emergency clause attached.

Segregating the assessment on the property of Lino Herman for the improvement of North Cottage street from Market to South street.

## CONFERENCE ON SEWER CALLED

The sewer committee of the city council and the city school board are to confer relative to facilities for sewer connections for the new school to be built on the Tuxedo park site. The sewer committee received instructions from the council last night to meet the school board.

The school board has made inquiry whether it will be able to make sewer connections, for the reason that the architect must have the information before they can complete certain plans.

Mayor Gleay said that the site is the natural course for the drainage of the entire section and declared that the city should install a system of pipes so put down that after the construction of the building it will never be necessary to disturb the school grounds by the laying of sewers.

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## DRAINAGE UNIT FAILURE RAPID BEFORE COUNCIL

A live picture of conditions existing in the southeast part of Salem as a result of the new drainage district's failure to get action was painted before the city council last night by J. G. Merchen, who was one of the original boosters for the drainage district.

Mr. Merchen declared that conditions are unsanitary, and that this statement was borne out by an investigation made by the county health officer. Drainage from the slaughter houses outside the city, he said, runs into the city with every freshet.

As a result of the conditions existing, he said, it had proved to be impossible to get a bus line into that section of the city and efforts to get 22nd street paved had hit a snag.

Mr. Merchen scored the drainage district supervisors for their failure to act, and he declared the realtors of the city are giving all their attention to the north part of the city, even knocking the southeast section at times.

"They can't be blamed," he said, "because that part of town is not a fit place to live or to raise children under present conditions, and the conditions are getting worse every year. A disease outbreak there would menace the whole city, so it is a city problem."

Mayor Gleay said he endorsed every word that had been spoken by Mr. Merchen.

"The people there are helpless," said the mayor. "The trouble is that the man who owns an acre outside the city but inside the drainage district has the same voting power that 10 home owners occupying single lots in the city have."

The people in the city are outvoted. Under present conditions it is impossible to get hydrants or sewers in southeast Salem."

Alderman Dancy said with refer-

ence to the slaughter houses that if they are not conducted in a sanitary manner they should be called to the attention of the state board of health.

There is a special committee of the city council to study the situation, but it was not yet ready with a report last night.
