

### KEIZER SCHOOL ENROLLMENT IS SHOWING GAINS

Quincy, Or., Oct. 13.—With the Keizer school almost the only one of the rural schools to have the ninth grade, or first year of high school work, it is running chuck-a-block, especially since there has been no means of transportation provided the pupils who would otherwise attend school in Salem.

Last year the enrollment reached something over 100, and it is believed that the number will be exceeded when all eligible pupils shall have enrolled. Two children of Roy Fukuda, who have paid tuition in order to attend Maplewood (formerly Perkins), for the past few years because they were too young to travel to their own school, are now enrolled at Keizer school, where there is much modern playground apparatus and a strong parent-teacher association that is of inestimable benefit to teachers and pupils. There is also a kitchen for the preparation of hot lunches, so vital to the health and comfort of the little ones.

### TRIBUTE IS PAID CLEAR LAKE MAN

Quincy, Or., Oct. 13.—So many friends assembled to pay a tribute of respect to James Herbert Mason, Sunday afternoon at Webb's chapel in Salem that even the reception rooms and offices were taxed for seating capacity. The Rev. J. L. Burns, pastor of the Evangelical church at Clear Lake spoke feelingly of the dead man, so wanting to be cut down while in the performance of his duty, of his 35 years residence here in which no man had ever had a grievance against him and finally of his devotion to his children, three little ones who could only lip their mother's name when she passed away about 25 years ago.

Mr. Mason was born in England, 41 years ago, coming to Canada at an early age and, with his parents, removing to this section in 1895. In 1898 he was married to Miss Bate of Clear Lake, who died about four years later while under medical treatment at San Francisco, leaving two sons, Lloyd and Calvin and a daughter, Ethyl (now Mrs. William Dorman). These children survive Mr. Mason, who has also two brothers, Charles Mason and R. H. Mason of Portland. Interment was made at Cinggett cemetery.
