attorney, who was of counsel for the defense in the murder case, returned from the state prison at Michigan City, where he had conferred with Stephenson and announced that the appeal would be filed soon. The time for filing the appeal expires December 14.

Adams recently made sweeping charges of corruption which he said could be corroborated by Stephenson if the former klan leader were given an opportunity to make a complete revelation. The publisher has insisted Stephenson be given a hearing at a special session of the state senate.

Adams declares: "We have evidence that will make this a national scandal. This cancer must be cut out of the republican party at all costs. We are able to support all our charges, many of them so shocking that they cannot be openly laid until a proper investigation is under way."

MOUNT ANGEL LOSS SWELLS FIRE TOTAL

The destruction of Mount Angel college by fire with a loss of \$500,000 swelled the Oregon fire loss outside of Portland for the month of September to a total of \$804,527, according to the monthly report of Will Moore, state insurance commissioner. Losses of \$10,000 more for the month were: Bend, postoffice and mail \$12,000; Bend, shingle mill \$50,000; Grand Ronde, school, \$15,000; Jackson county, dwelling and contents and hay, \$10,000; Medford, box factory, \$25,000; Mount Angel, college, \$500,000; Polk county, prune dryer and prunes, \$10,000; Terrebonne, store and contents, \$10,000; Umatilla county, hotel and contents, \$15,000; Union county, public building, \$17,000.
