

STAYTON PAYS FINAL TRIBUTE TO DEAD YOUTH

—Stayton, Oct. 21.—Funeral services were held here Tuesday afternoon at the Weddle Undertaking parlors, for Stanley Cieslack, the sixteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cieslack of Silver Creek Falls.

Stanley Cieslack, who was a freshman in the Stayton high school, lost his life as the result of an automobile accident which occurred several weeks ago during a racing episode.

The funeral service was presided over by Rev. Vernon Douglas, an alumnus of Stayton high school, who is now attending the Eugene Bible school. The pallbearers were John Perry, Harold Berg, Douglas Foster, Don Goode, Ralph Serantzen and Quintan Gehlen, all pupils in the Stayton high school. Sacred music was rendered by a girl's quartette consisting of Lucille Caspell; Ruth Reese, Dilda Traak and Esther Reese.

Stayton high school was dismissed at 2 o'clock so that members of the student body might attend the services.

The funeral was one of the largest that has ever been held in Stayton and the floral offerings were beautiful. All business houses were closed during the funeral hours.

The deceased is survived by his parents, and a younger brother, Leo.
