

47TH BIRTHDAY ELECTRIC LIGHT OBSERVED TODAY

West Orange, N. J., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Today was the 47th birth of the electric light. Thomas A. Edison, who invented it, is recognized that his profession blazes the way to universal peace.

"Invention has not led to war," he said. "Invention has produced a reasoning and a questioning age. People are becoming, because of the changes brought about by invention, more intelligent and will not stand for exploitation by persons and kings and societies. There is more reasoning and questioning today than ever before. We are in the process of ascending those things which in the past have been breeders of war and oppression. The field is unlimited. If I were to begin my career over again I would turn to electric light, heat and chemical reactions. The young man so inclined should have no hesitation in taking up invention as a profession, provided he has imagination and the will to work."

Mr. Edison, stooped by age, carefully dressed, with a faded white rose dropping from the lapel of his old office coat, took time from his work, a rarely granted privilege, to recall the day that followed his discovery that a loop of carbonized sewing thread, sealed in a bulb from which the air had been pumped and connected with electric current, would burn for 48 hours.

On New Year's eve, 1879, he remembered, 3000 persons traveled to Menlo park to view the amazing new lamp from which he developed one of the world's greatest industries, but it was not until 1882 that the first central generating station in Pearl street, New York, was placed in operation.
