

AMITY ELEVEN QUITE ELATED OVER VICTORY

Amity, Nov. 13.—On Armistice day Amity high eleven won from McMinnville high line-up in the most exciting game of the season. The game was an overwhelming victory for Amity with the score 26 to 12.

Barnes scored the first touchdown for Mac in the first few minutes of the game. He made a splendid run of ninety yards down an open field. Then Amity received the ball and marched down the field on line plunges for a touchdown. Mac kicked and on the return, Wood, one of Amity's warriors made a spectacular run of seventy-five yards down a broken field for a touchdown. He had splendid interference on the part of Amity's team. The score at the end of the first quarter stood 13 to 6 in Amity's favor.

During the second quarter Mac made their second, and what proved to be their final touchdown. Amity made little yardage. In the third quarter Amity's goal was in constant danger, but neither team scored. However, in the last quarter Amity greatly outplayed Mac and by means of a series of line plunges and one successful pass two touchdowns were made for Amity.

This game was of great significance to Amity as this is the second time in the history of the high school that Amity has won this annual contest. Many alumni were there to witness the game and Amity had a splendid rooting section.

Next Friday Amity squad will meet the Dallas team on the home field.

SALVAGING OF OLD BUILDING IS UNDER WAY

Independence, Nov. 13.—Hogan brothers are getting along rapidly with the salvaging of the old school building. The two upper stories are torn down and they are now working on the first floor with only the brick wall remaining.

Work will soon be started on the new gymnasium playshed, which was proposed and decided upon at a recent school election. At that time the school board was authorized to issue \$12,000 in interest bearing warrants for the proposed construction of a one-story and full basement gymnasium of hollow tile construction with stucco finish. These warrants shall bear 6 per cent interest, payable semi-annually, and will be sold to the highest bidder.

G. E. La Salle of Gladstone, Or., was given the contract to build the building and he plans to start work as soon as the required material can be brought here. He has been given 90 days in which to complete the contract. This contract does not include the plumbing and heating and wiring. The later contract has been given to A. E. Drake of Albany. The heating and plumbing have not been considered up to this date.

TANNERY CREW AGAIN ACTIVE; MARKETS GOOD

Dallas, Or., Nov. 13.—For the first time in six years the leather market is in excellent condition and the local tannery is working at top speed and has more orders than it can fill, according to A. B. Muir, of the Muir & McDonald tannery, pioneer Dallas concern.

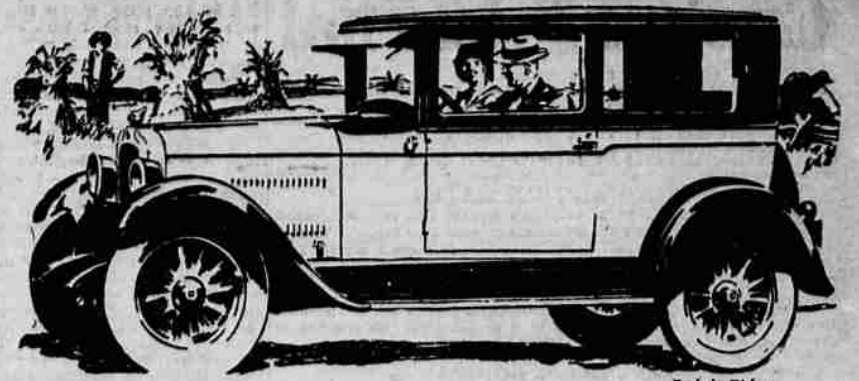
The market has been improving steadily for the past three months after six years of depression, Mr. Muir says.

The product of the tannery goes largely to the middle west and California where it is used in the manufacture of saddles, collars, etc. Another market that takes considerable high grade leather is that of the manufacture of fancy leather belts. This requires a thin, uniform leather tanned from the skins of two-year-old cattle.

Aside from the indication of development of normal business conditions, the leather market forecasts the return of the horse on the farm. The displacing of teams by farm tractors slumped the harness business greatly several years ago, and there was practically no demand for harness leather.

The leather belt business indicates that the leather men are winning back some of the ground they lost with the development of leather substitutes and composition products.

The hides used by the local tannery come chiefly from Polk and Marion counties.



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
