

REICHEL RITES ARE HELD FROM CHURCH SUNDAY

Woodburn, Or., Dec. 12.—Funeral services for Mrs. Amelia Reichel, wife of August Reichel, who died suddenly Thursday morning, were held at the First Presbyterian church yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The service was presided over by Rev. O. C. Weller of Portland, formerly pastor of the Woodburn church and a personal friend of the deceased. Music was by Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Larson, Mrs. J. W. Richards presiding at the piano. Walter Be. J. of Portland, a nephew of Mrs. Reichel, sang "Some Day We'll Understand." The pallbearers were John Twocle, Frank Stanton, William Flongie, A. Frank Stanton, C. J. Rice and O. W. Noyes. The Royal Neighbors, Modern Woodmen and members of the Woodburn Grange attended in a body. There were many beautiful floral pieces from these orders and from friends and relatives. Christian burial services were held at Belle Pass Cemetery.

Amelia Reichel was born April 18, 1854, at Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, where she spent her early childhood. In 1884, with her parents, she moved to Red Lake Falls, Minnesota, where on November 29, 1888, she was married to August Reichel. Mr. Reichel made their home until 1902, when they came to Oregon, locating on the home place 4 1/2 miles east of Woodburn. Four years ago they left the farm and moved to their present home on East Cleveland street, where they have since resided.

Four children were born to this union, two sons and two daughters. One son, Albert, died at the age of nine years at Red Lake Falls. The remaining children are Mrs. L. H. Shorey, wife of Woodburn's postmaster; a son, Darrel, and daughter, Irene, both of whom are students at the Oregon Agricultural college, and who, with her husband, survive here. She also leaves two granddaughters, Louise and Gertrude Shorey of Woodburn. An invalid sister, Mrs. Adeline Turner, resides in California and is the only surviving member of a family of seven.

Mrs. Reichel was a member of the Woodburn Grange, of which she was a past master and was past master of the Royal Neighbors. In early life she affiliated with the Presbyterian church and was also a member of the Ladies Aid society and the W. C. T. U.

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MINSTREL SHOW IS GIRLS' PLAN

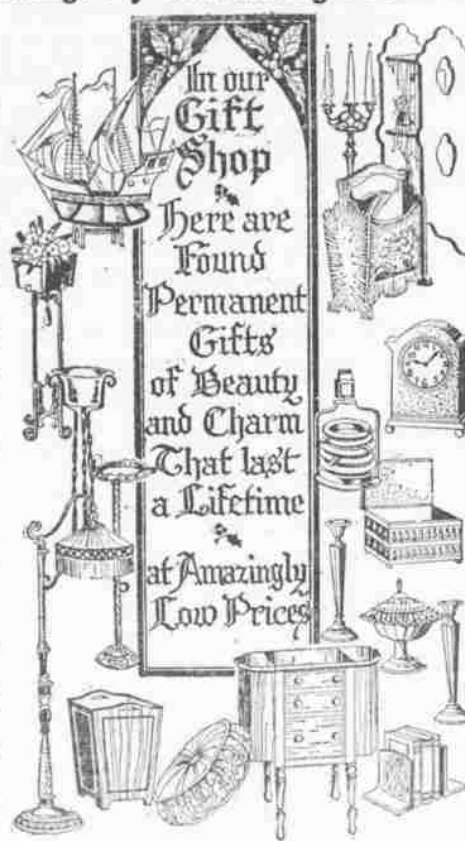

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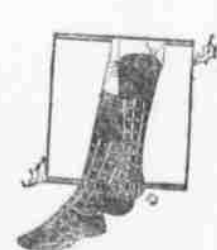
