Woodburn, Jan. 8.—The Woodburn health council of organizations of the Marion county health demonstration met in the city hall last night. Mrs. Della Overton, the president in charge. Reports were given by the various heads of departments. Plans were made for the January clinic which will be held on Wednesday, January 26 at which time it is hoped to have at least 15 children for examination. The assistants at this clinic will be Mrs. C. J. Epp, Mrs. Peter Brachmann, Mrs. W. F. Norman, Mrs. W. D. Simmons and Mrs. H. Overton.

Mrs. Lydia King, county health nurse, told of the splendid cooperation received from the doctors and teachers of Woodburn in stamping out the threatened epidemic of scarlet fever and stated that the health council had developed. Mrs. W. F. Norman reported that three children had been taken to Salem to the Deaconess hospital where two had been operated on for tonsils and adenoids and a third had received an examination of the eyes and was given glasses. The operating was done by Dr. Lee Wood.

Plans for the class in home nursing were discussed and Mrs. F. W. Seltzer was appointed to secure the names of those wishing to enroll for the course. There will be no charge except a small fee for a textbook. Anyone interested should confer with Mrs. Seltzer.

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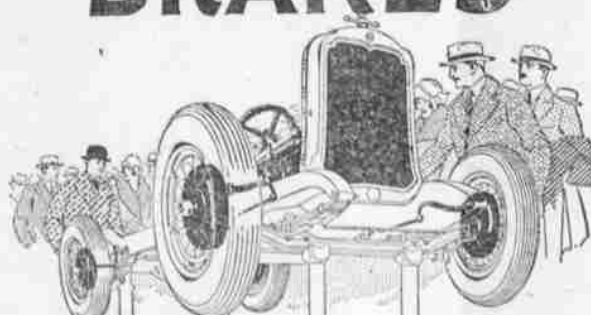
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
