Famous Violinist To Play Here

The third concert in the Salem series is scheduled for next Tuesday evening, January 18, and in the opinion of a large number of music lovers will prove the most important musical event of the season. At this time the brilliant Russian-Jewish violinist, Cecelia Hansen, will be heard.

The tone of Cecelia Hansen is already known as the "Hansen tone," as something different and apart, something so marked that there are no other words left to describe it, although some critics have tried to approximate it by referring to it as the "Aure tone." It is individual and of tremendous power and purity. Technically she is acknowledged the master of the instrument to the limit of its possibilities and her violin is a famous Stradivarius which once belonged to Wilhelm.

Miss Hansen's New York debut in 1925 was one of the most sensational of many seasons. Columns have been written about the technique, and power, the beauty and spirituality of her playing. Said "Vocalist" in the Toronto Telegram: "Radiant and refreshing—that is the song of the violin in the hands of Cecelia Hansen, a young Russian violinist. Tall, fair-haired, and beautiful as a picture of northern climes, the young player seems but a physical embodiment of the song her genius sings. Her tone is rich and vibrant, powerful. It is a tone that grips you, holds you fast and leaves you satisfied. It is tender beyond description but its sympathy is not naive. It is passionate but there is heaven's blessed breath about it. It is a new song. Cecelia Hansen's fiddle sings, a song of youth and hopefulness, beauty and courage, and the sun never fades in a single phrase."

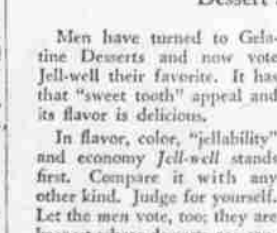
