

42 HOUSE MEMBERS SPONSOR PAY RAISE

MASK \$5 RAISE AS ADDITIONAL EXPENSE MONEY

Bearing the names of Representatives Gordon and 41 other members of the house the resolution authorizing an appropriation of \$5 a day added expense money for members of the legislature was introduced in the house yesterday afternoon, with the number of its sponsors assuring its passage in that body. Its adoption by the senate is also forecast by those behind the move.

Part of the justification pleaded for the resolution is the added expense to which the solons have been put by the increased living expenses they meet in Salem each year.

"Prices are boosted whenever we arrive in town," said Gordon. "This year the apartment house managers have gone so far as to annex a deliberate increase of \$10 a month on apartment rents to anyone connected with the legislative session."

Other members complained of the increase in rates of room rentals in private houses, and further explained their support of the resolution by pointing out that they now receive less per day than the stenographers they employ.

In the senate the sentiment regarding the resolution appears to be about equally divided, most of the members admitting that the compensation paid is unreasonable but many believing that the spirit of evasion running through the resolution in disguising compensation as an expense money is not the proper manner of procedure.

PAY INCREASES FOR KAY, KOZER REVIVED

The question of increasing the salaries of the secretary of state, treasurer and attorney general from \$4200 to \$5400 a year will come up again in the present session. A bill providing for such an increase was passed last session but was vetoed by Governor Pierce. On motion of R. S. Hamilton, of Bend, the bill No. 259 was brought to life by being placed on the table for consideration.

SWAN HEADS REPEAL OF LAWS COMMITTEE

Speaker Carlin has appointed L. L. Swan, of Linn county, as chairman of the newly authorized repeal of laws committee. Other members named were Representatives Lewis, Potter, Longman and Huxbert. Carlin told the committee that he had about 20 proposed propositions for repeal and urged other house members to dig up useless and superfluous sections for consideration of the committee. Chairman Swan announced that he would welcome suggestions for repeal from persons over the state.

Charles H. Grakelov of Philadelphia, graduate school of the Elks, will address the Oregon legislature in joint session for 15 minutes next Monday forenoon, both house and senate adopting a joint resolution to that effect yesterday. Mr. Grakelov is to be the house guest at a special session of the Schumacher lodge Sunday night and will be in Portland Monday night.

STATE BUDGET CUT TO PIECES BY LEGISLATURE

When the joint ways and means committee of the Oregon legislature gets through with the state budget, as approved by the budget commission before the session, that imposing array of figures is going to be a marbled ruin. Every member of the committee sat down at the table last night with a wicked glitter in his eye. The pack fell upon the state's financial document and ripped, tore and slashed off requested appropriations sometimes by quarters or halves.

The members of the committee were not agreed upon all things, and some of the things done were of doubtful wisdom. The state library, for example, which ex-Governor Pierce says is of more value to the state than any normal school, college or university, was rammed squarely into the list of things to be cut by one or two members to save it.

"If anyone ever heard of anybody using the state library," Senator Bell wanted to know.

"I see they want quite a capital outlay to buy more novels," remarked another member.

Representative S. P. Peirce arose to his defense and insisted that the full request of \$115,045 be allowed.

Senator Staples, chairman of the senate wing of the committee, wanted to cut it to \$50,000, more than 50 per cent. Strayer objected that the library does a good work, but said there was a limit to what the committee can allow. The upshot was that the figure was cut to \$75,000.

The secretary of state was criticized for paying his clerks and stenographers too much.

"Thousands of competent men—very competent—are looking for jobs at less money than last year," declared Staples.

McCallister moved that Koser be called before the committee before the knife was put to his budget.

"Then you break the rule we just made, that we will call in as few people as possible," warned Gordon.

The motion failed.

The committee marveled at the high pay accorded clerks in the board of control office, and a notation in the budget that the department needs an automobile that can be operated with "dignity to the board" brought a laugh from some of the committeemen. The knife fell again.

When it came to the attorney general's request, Staples averred that the expense had increased 25 per cent since 1923, and over \$5000 was lopped off. Likewise the supreme court library suffered.

The request of the public service commission was held for investigation by a special committee on which Bell, Peirce and McCallister were named. Bell objected to serving because of his close association with L. E. Bean, one of the committeemen, but was persuaded.

Senator Strayer said he felt with Governor Pierce, that the commission ought to be abolished or pay its own way. Staples said it was easy to see that the commission had tried to exhaust all of its funds.

The department of weights and measure was held in abeyance because the committee is going to try to have it transferred from the market agent's department to the food and dairy department. The clerk was told to draw up a bill to that effect.

When the state blind school came along the axe fell again and \$6499 lumbled into the executioner's basket. The deaf school was held up because of a request that farming be re-established there, and a special committee was named.

All state educational institutions were deferred.

Senator Strayer hurled invectives at the predatory animal hunters who want \$45,000.

"They don't do 20 cents worth of good," said Strayer. "It's the biggest joke in Oregon."

Senator Mann and others defended the item. It was cut \$5000.

At the end of the evening's deliberations Representative Buchanan named the committee because of its haste.

"We have come here this evening and acted like a bunch of kids, galloping through the budget as we have," declared Buchanan.

Gordon insisted that the committee had been very reasonable, but Buchanan insisted that the budget commission in its recommendations had used some judgment, while the ways and means committee wasn't using any.

Prior to the passing of the budget the committee listened to State Treasurer Kay, who explained the financial condition of the state.

\$694,210 SOUGHT FOR THREE SCHOOLS

Appropriations totaling \$694,210 for normal schools were recommended by the board of regents of normal schools at a meeting here yesterday.

For the new normal school to be established at La Grande the board recommended \$175,000 for a building and \$40,000 for maintenance and salaries. For the southern Oregon normal at Ashland \$150,000 was recommended for a new dormitory to house 150 students and \$22,210 for maintenance.

For the Menomath normal \$175,000 was recommended for a class room and library building and \$21,000 for maintenance. For the latter item the state budget commission recommended only \$30,000.

The recommendations will go to the ways and means committee of the legislature.

SENATE VOTES FAVORABLY ON 35 MILE SPEED

Senators Eddy and Bailey signed a minority report of the roads and highways committee yesterday and recommended against a measure proposing to increase the legal speed limit of automobiles from 20 to 35 miles an hour. They were successful, however, in getting the minority report substituted for the majority report and the latter was adopted, placing the measure on its way to final passage later.

"I do not consider this bill necessary or proper," Eddy said. "A motorist can now drive 35 miles and not be interfered with. When you increase the limit to 35 miles you are doing it not for careful drivers alone, but for everyone, and we are killing too many people. I do not believe in the theory that the way to avoid accidents is to increase speed."

Senator Dunn, who is president of the State Motor association which is back of the bill, declared that speed is not responsible for most accidents. Senator Miller declared the time is coming when all limits will be removed, and that what may be said against a 35-mile speed may also be said

against 30 miles. He said the change would add to the comfort and convenience of tourists and that it is a step toward uniformity of regulation among the states.

Eddy asked for a roll call and Bailey, Dunn and Carner voted with him for the minority report. Deals and Bell were absent.

BAR PORTLANDERS FROM BOARD, PLEA

Portland would be excluded from having a voice on the state textbook commission, if a bill presented by Representative Claude Buchanan, Benton county, becomes a law. The measure would provide that no school district of more than 20,000 school population be represented on the commission through appointment from the governor. Portland at present has two members on the commission.

The bill would also provide that the superintendent of public instruction be a member of the commission. Other members would continue to be appointed by the governor.
