

HEALTH CLINIC FOR MILL CITY HAS NEW PHASE

Mill City, Or., Jan. 21.—The Marion county health demonstration held a dental clinic here Tuesday, and Wednesday held their regular monthly general clinic.

A new phase to the work is to be introduced here in the near future, it being the permanent immunization of children against diphtheria. Miss Marion Lord of Salem, acting as county nurse, was here Monday getting the work started, the first of the "shots" to be given the children January 27.

Through the co-operation of the state board of health, the county health demonstration and the committee from the local medical society the price has been reduced to the nominal sum of 25 cents per child, which is used to partially offset the cost of the toxin-antitoxin.

Members of the nursing committee are canvassing the town, acquainting the parents as to how this medicine will function and, inasmuch as the treatment will immunize the patient against diphtheria for probably their life time, this state board of health is behind the work urging all to accept the treatment. Applications should be made to Miss Lord, county nurse; Rev. Gray, chairman of the health demonstration, or any member of the Women's club.
