

BOYS CONFESS PROWLING AND HELD TO JURY

Monmouth, Or., Jan. 21.—Ernest Riddell, who came home from California to find that his house had been entered during his absence and some house furniture taken, had today located all of the boys arrested during the crime. One of them, William Mason, was found at the home of his parents here, while the other, Bernard Bidwell, was found near Tillamook, where he has been staying for the last two weeks. Both boys readily confessed and also told where the goods could be found as they had disposed of them in Salem.

William Mason had his hearing yesterday before Justice Baker of Independence and was handed over to the grand jury. His bond was set at \$250. Bernard Bidwell will have his hearing as soon as he is returned here.

WOMAN POISONS SELF AND CHILDREN

Tracy, Cal., Jan. 21.—(AP)—Mrs. Mary Hanson and two of her children, Rose, 7, and William, 12 months, and dead today and two other Hanson children are in a local hospital seriously ill from the effects of poison said to have been given the children by their mother.

Manuel Hanson, the husband, returned to his home last night to find his wife and two of the children dead and the two others, Mary 4, and Joseph 2, writhing in pain. Authorities are of the opinion that Mrs. Hanson gave the children the poison with their evening meal.

Hanson could give no motive for the act.

RICKARD PLANS CONCRETE BOWL

New York, Jan. 21.—The wooden stands on Boyle's Thirty Acres in Jersey City are to be demolished and on the site probably will rise a huge concrete and steel bowl costing \$1,500,000 and capable of seating 100,000 persons, Tex Rickard said today.

The new arena will be constructed, the promoter said, if the New Jersey boxing laws are amended to permit decisions and a top seat price of \$50 instead of the \$25 limit now in force. He indicated his belief that these changes would be made in the state law.

Boyle's Thirty Acres, a pine structure, was erected by Rickard in 1921 at a cost of \$345,000 for the bout between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier.

SPAIN TO SEND CRUISER TO CHINA

London, Jan. 21.—(AP)—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Madrid says that the Spanish government has decided to send the cruiser Don Blas Lezo to Shanghai immediately.

The dispatch says that the decision was taken as a result of reports from China telling of outrages in Fukien involving a Spanish bishop and a Spanish orphanage, and in order to protect twenty Swedish subjects who are in Shanghai, and Spanish missions in China generally.

TRUCK BILL OFFERED

A certificate of convenience and public necessity would be required of bus and truck operators desiring to establish services of Representative Archie McGowan, of Grant and Harney counties, obtains passage of house bill 123 introduced today. The bill would become an amendment to house bill 413 which was passed by the 1925 session covering the fees and regulations of truck and bus operators.

The amendment proposed by McGowan, if enacted into law, would give established lines a bulwark against unfair competition. McGowan's bill is one of a series recommended by the State Automotive conference.
