

TEACHERS FOR SILVERTON AT BIG INSTITUTE

Silverton, Or., Jan. 29.—A local teachers institute was held in the Silverton high school assembly room today, beginning at 10 o'clock this morning. There was primary work from 10 to 11 o'clock with a paper by Lulu Dale of Silverton; round table discussions on phonics and reading by Olga Johnson of Silverton.

There was also advance department work on graphs as a means of secure speed and comprehension in reading by Katherine Galtich of Silverton from 11 to 11.15, and making maps in teaching geography by Ruth Gottfried of Silverton from 11 to 12.

A paper on maintaining class room interest in the high school department by G. W. DeLay of Silverton from 12 to 1, and new type tests by Ed Tringstad from 1 to 1.15. An hour was taken for lunch. The afternoon session opened at 1:30 with music by the Silverton high school glee club; a vocal solo by Alfred Bostie, vocal solo by LaVelle Yantis and several more selections by the club.

A paper on "The Purpose of Teaching United States History and Civics" from 2 to 2.45, by W. A. Lane of Silverton; paper on "Physical Exercises" 2.45 to 3, by R. E. Boardman of the Salem Y. M. C. A.; paper on "Ungraded Schools," 3 o'clock, by E. A. Miller, principal of the Grant school and director of ungraded classes of Salem, were the principal features of the afternoon program. The institute was exceptionally well attended. A great deal of good advice and instruction is obtained at these local institutes for the nearby teachers.

OLD RESIDENT OF COUNTY IS DEAD IN SALEM

Silverton, Or., Jan. 29.—Mrs. Barbara Haberly, aged 86 years, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Arthur Keene of Winter street, Salem, Friday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, after a short illness of a couple of days. She will be buried Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock from the Rigdon parlors in Salem and will be laid to rest in the City View cemetery by the side of her husband, who preceded her in death about 12 years.

Mrs. Haberly was born in Germany and came to this country when about 25 years old and first settled in Salem. Soon after this she and her husband moved to a farm in the Waldo Hills about six miles from Silverton. About 15 years ago they left the farm to take their sons and moved to Salem again.

Mrs. Haberly has lived in Oregon over 40 years. She leaves to mourn her loss three sons, W. J. and L. E. Haberly of the Waldo Hills and J. M. Haberly of Seattle, and one daughter, Mrs. Arthur Keene of Salem.

Mrs. Mary E. Maulding aged 78 years, died at her home in Sheridan, Thursday night, of heart disease, after an illness of several weeks. She leaves a husband, J. W. Maulding of Sheridan; three sons, Frank Maulding of Willamina, Vernon Maulding of Bozeng and Frisby Maulding of Roseburg; two daughters, Mrs. Lillian Denmore of Sheridan and Mrs. Irma Schmitt of Gresham; two brothers, Harry and Pitt of near Silverton.

DIPHTHERIA TOXIN GIVEN TO PUPILS

Mill City, Or., Jan. 29.—Dr. L. L. Douglas, county health officer, assisted by Miss Lord, county nurse, and a committee of the local Marion county health demonstration workers, administered the first of a series of three inoculations for the permanent immunization against diphtheria to approximately 250 children here Thursday afternoon, nearly 130 being unable to take the treatment on account of the supply of toxin-antitoxin being exhausted.

These treatments are given one week apart, and next week preparations are being made to take care of 400 patients. This is the largest number to avail themselves of the opportunity in any of the towns in the county. Next fall, some of those taking the treatment now will be tested to ascertain how the medicine affected them, and if not fully immunized will be treated again.

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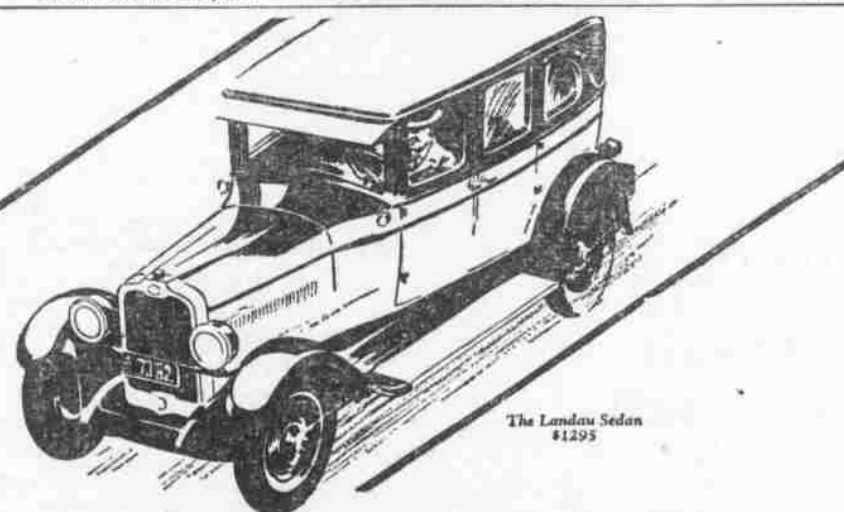


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
