

INDEPENDENCE JEWELER DIES VERY SUDDENLY

Independence, March 21.—William Lee Wright, a resident of Independence for the past five years, passed away very suddenly at his home Saturday afternoon at 4:20 o'clock.

Wright, who was a jeweler by profession, was apparently in good health and was at his place of business an hour prior to his death. His family were in Salem at the time and were called home suddenly but Wright had succumbed before they arrived here. He was 62 years, 9 months and 24 days at the time of his death.

William Wright was born at Rio, Illinois, May 21, 1864, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Wright of Kentucky. He came to Oregon 47 years ago, settling in McMinnville until five years ago when the family moved to Independence.

He is survived by his wife, Hattie Wright and the following children: Clarence M. Sherman; Mrs. Lole Barber, Massillon; Mrs. Loretta Vulliamy, Oakland, Calif.; and Laura Wright, Salem. He had two brothers, J. Lytle Wright, Tillamook, and George Wright, Liberty, Neb., a sister, Mrs. Belle Epperson, who is making her home with the Wrights. His daughter, Mrs. Loretta Vulliamy of Oakland, is visiting her parents at the present time.
