

### FEDERATION OF POLK CLUBS TO MEET APRIL 27

Dallas, Or., April 21.—The second annual meeting of the Polk County Federated clubs will be held in the county court house, Dallas, Wednesday evening, April 27, according to letters sent out by Winnie Braden, secretary of the chamber of commerce. The twenty affiliated organizations have, through their united effort re-established the county agricultural agent service in the county and have furnished an organization medium for the working out of better agricultural program. The work on cherry maggot control which was started and carried through this organization last year justified all the effort of keeping up the organization. The federation is the one medium of bringing together the representatives of all associations that are organized for the improvement of the various communities, the county and the residents. Through the efforts of the committee from the federation a great deal was accomplished in boys and girls club work. County Agent Beck is giving considerable serious thought to the subject, and it is hoped, will be ready to suggest a program at an early meeting.

Following the election of officers, the committee appointed at a recent meeting at Oak Grove, consisting of Hoge, Rowland and Fawc, will make a detailed report on agricultural economics.

T. W. Zimmerman, executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest Real Estate association, will explain the object of the farm lands conference which has been called in the chamber of commerce rooms, Salem, May 11 and 12.

Arthur Foster, field agent on land settlement for the state chamber of commerce, will tell of his three months business trip in the states of the middle west and of the conditions he found there. He will also tell of the marketing conditions he found when he asked the grocers for Oregon prices.

Through the efforts of Foster, the committees appointed on land settlement some time ago will be re-organized and a definite land settlement program carried out. These committees consisting of C. W. Irvine, Dr. Bowersox, H. Mather Smith, A. E. Utley, J. R. Loy, Frank Laughary, Lee Arnett, Lomer Ralston and Frank Fawc will meet with Foster at 7 o'clock that they may be able to report when the federation convenes at 8 o'clock.
