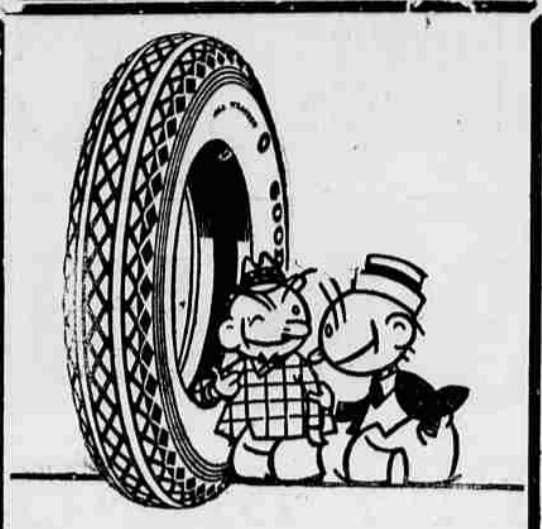
COMMUNITY CLUB MEETS IN STAYTON
