An item of interest to Oregonians and especially those descended from pioneer families, is the word that the "Book of Remembrance, Marion County Pioneers 1840-1860," from the pen of Sarah Hunt Steeves, this city, the first volume of this series is practically ready for the press.

Mrs. Steeves is a daughter of pioneer parents and was reared among pioneer neighbors. It is her desire to preserve as many of the records of these sturdy pathfinders as possible, for future generations.

The author plans to begin work on the second volume very soon and would be delighted to communicate with any one wishing to offer family data, providing they were pioneers prior to 1860.

Mrs. Steeves is very eager to put on record pioneer anecdotes, tales of hardship, Indian skirmishes and all data pertaining to the crossing of the plains and the early settlement of Marion county by these pioneer families.

Mrs. Steeves has been a contributor to the Oregon Magazine and other publications of the northwest for several years, but this is to be her first book.
