CITY OF SALEM TO GET \$11,000

the county court in improving roads. It also provided that the remaining 50 per cent should be remitted to the various road districts in proportion to their assessed valuation, to be spent in those districts respectively. The law also provides that in the case of incorporated cities and towns which comprise road districts in themselves, the money shall be paid over to the cities of towns and disbursed by them without restriction that it must be spent on streets connecting with market roads.

The law became effective in 1926 and the road levy for that year was made by the county court under its provisions. But the provision regarding the rebate to the cities and towns was not discovered, nor was the rebate made for that year. The requirement was, however, revealed to the county court several months ago and in making the road levy of 4.6 mills for this year provision was made for the rebates to all of the incorporated municipalities.

The rebate of \$11,000 to Salem represents the first to be made, and the total amount of the money to be returned to all of the cities and towns in the county remains yet to be determined.

Whether the cities and towns will seek to collect the money which should have been paid to them under the levy for 1926 also remains to be determined but, inasmuch as all of this money has been spent on the roads it is not anticipated that the municipalities will press their claims for 1926, the collection of which would be costly and problematical.

BROOM FACTORY BURNS

Portland, Or., May 13.—Fire of undetermined origin early this morning completely razed the Standard broom factory, 1855 East Gilson street, causing a loss of \$16,000, according to estimates of Captain McFarland of the fire marshal's office. It is being investigated.

RAGGED RECLUSE CAPTURED, ASTORIA

Astoria, Ore., May 13.—(AP)—Authorities today were trying to ascertain the identity of the "Walluski Wisp," a ragged recluse, who has been living in the wilds of Clatsop county for four years. The elusive "wild man" was captured last night by two men out hunting for dogs.

VIOLATED CITY BUILDING CODE

For failing to take out a city plumbing permit, M. J. Boatright of Salem faces a complaint filed against him yesterday in justice court by R. T. Holmes, deputy state labor commissioner, in inspecting plumbing. Holmes and Batey Cooper city sanitary inspector, happened to meet at the dwelling Boatright is building at 1800 Waller street.

Inspection showed that the state plumbing code as well as the city plumbing code was being violated. Cooper believes that by neglecting to take out a plumbing permit Boatright hoped to avoid the attention of officers. When the place was inspected yesterday most of the plumbing had been sealed up by plastering.

The state plumbing code is stronger and takes precedence over the city code, Cooper pointed out. In the city code a main vent pipe of two inches is required, while in the state code it must be four. The state code requires that every fixture have a separate vent besides the main vent for the entire plumbing system, while the city code does not require that bath tubs have a separate vent. Failure of builders or plumbers to take out permits will result in prosecution whenever possible, Cooper said today.

MILLION ACRES IN SUGAR BELT

The workmen. Many refugees fled today were men who had been struggling against the rising waters for a week. Two days ago they had thrown aside all clothing except shirts and trousers and yesterday they were drowned as they worked in the rain. Many of them were chilled and suffering from exposure when they reached concentration camps.

SECOND BREAK

The first reported break along the main Bayou Des Glaises levee was at Moreville, but shortly afterward came news of a second break at Bordelonneville, also along the Big Bend stretch. Both places are approximately 150 miles northwest of New Orleans and on the opposite side of the river.

Evacuation of the Bordelonneville district was conducted last night by boats and overland and there were no reports of loss of life. Surf boats and barges were at the scene today to care for any who might still be in the section.

The course of the waters, as charted by engineers, would take them through five new parishes, affecting 105,000 persons covering an area of 1873 square miles, or 1,198,720 acres.

Baton Rouge, La., May 13.—(AP)—The tremendous pressure of the greatest Mississippi river flood in history finally broke down the Big Bend levee today at Moreville on cane, cotton, rice, corn and sweet potatoes. The levee, made of clay, had resisted the steadily rising flood of the waters rushing down from Arkansas and through the crevasses on the west bank of the Mississippi which already have blanketed 13 Louisiana parishes. For the past week more than 1000 workers labored day and night to strengthen the embankment and efforts will be made if possible to close the break.

John M. Parker, Louisiana flood director, said that 25,000 people and 1,000,000 acres much of it marsh land, in the immediately vicinity of the bayou, mostly in Avoyelles parish, will be affected by the break.

As the muddy waters from the break run through the Atchafalaya basin into Grand lake and through its bayous to the gulf, sixty thousand more people will be driven from their homes and nearly one million acres, much of it marshland, is expected to break down levees on the Atchafalaya river and cause the spreading of that stream's swollen waters over a huge thickly populated region, jeopardizing more than 150,000 people.

The region is the "sugar bowl" of Louisiana, the southern parishes where practically all sugar cane of the country is grown. Besides sugar cane, cotton, rice, corn and sweet potatoes are leading crops.

State Commissioner of Agriculture Wilson today estimated the loss from the new flood to be \$10,000,000. The parishes in the flood path include the lower half of Avoyelles, south of the Red river, one-third of St. Landry, two-thirds of St. Martin and two-fifths of Iberville, while a small part of Rapides will be under water.

Practically all of the refugees fled with only the clothing they were wearing. Most of them were men who had been working on the levees. Two days ago they had stripped themselves to shirts and trousers while working in the hot sun. When yesterday's rain came they did not stop work to put on more clothing. Consequently many reached Torras badly chilled and suffering from exposure.

Mr. Parker expressed the belief that this might cause much illness and instructed the boats in the vicinity to lend all possible aid and sent word by radio for the coast guard vessels near Simmerport with 18 surfboats to go and evacuate marooned refugees.

Six seaplanes, the entire air fleet stationed at Natchez, were sent today to Torras to take supplies to marooned refugees in the Big Bend area.

JUDGE KELLY SETS CASES FOR COMING TERM

Delayed a week by a prolonged murder trial in Albany, Judge Percy Kelly arrived in Salem this morning to hear motions, demurrers and set cases for the May term of Department One, circuit court, beginning next Monday morning.

A motion was made by defendants in the case involving the former Phi Kappa Pi fraternity of Willamette university, but after argument the motion was overruled and the defendants now have five days in which to answer the original complaint filed by the Merchants' Credit bureau against Charles Eirey and 28 others, former students, whom it is claimed, failed to settle a grocery bill the credit bureau seeks to collect.

A motion by the defendant in the case brought by the London and Lancashire Indemnity company of America against Will H. Block was sustained by the court.

Judge Kelly set cases for the next term and will be in court again tomorrow to complete arrangements for the coming term. The following list of cases already set gives the case name and the date set for each.

EVIDENCE NOT LEGALLY GOT

Ray Wyley continued his fight to free himself from a conviction in justice court for the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor by filing a petition in circuit court today to suppress evidence entered by the state.

Wyley was convicted of unlawful possession after trial in justice court on that charge and another charge of maintaining a common nuisance. His bail was fixed at \$1000 on appeal and he is out on bail now. His attorney, Paul Burris, filed the petition this morning after appealing the case recently from justice court to circuit court.

In the petition Wyley alleges that he was peaceably at home with his wife and children, but downstairs in the basement when officers entered his premises and proceeded to search it against his protest and without a warrant. They found two pint bottles of moonshine, but now Wyley maintains that since this evidence was obtained unlawfully without a search warrant that it cannot be used against him in his trial.
