

INDIAN SCHOOL PREPARING FOR COMMENCEMENT

Chemawa, Ore., May 21.—Extensive preparations are being completed for a seven-day commencement week program at the Salem Indian school. The program, which includes sports, the operetta, for which the school is famous, industrial exhibits, memorial services, competitive drill, alumni and student meetings and other activities of interest, will open on Sunday afternoon, May 29th with the annual competitive drill by the school companies, followed in the evening by the baccalaureate address by Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette university.

The operetta, "Pepita," will be given three nights this year instead of two as in the past. Therefore the Indians have presented the operetta but two nights, one for the students and the other for visitors, but two nights will be given to the public, due to popular demand. Practice for the operetta has been going on for some time and more than usual efforts are being given to make it one of the best ever presented at the school. It will be given in Spokane for two or three nights next fall when the Third Annual National Indian Congress will convene. Chemawa was featured for two nights in Spokane last year and received many commitments.

On Monday Memorial services will be held, in which veterans of the Civil War, Spanish-American and World wars will participate. In the evening the operetta will be given in the school auditorium for the students.

FINAL FIGHT ON 'IL PLAN OPENS

Chicago, May 21.—(AP)—What may be the final court onslaught of the Jameson committee of minority holders of bonds of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway on the reorganization plan of the majority bondholders, was begun today in the United States circuit court of appeals with former Governor Miller of New York, attacking the receivership and reorganization program as precipitated by the officers and directors of the railroad for the purpose of financial reorganization. This culminated, he said, in the foreclosures suit and sale of the road.

PLANS FLIGHT TO AUSTRALIA

St. Louis, Mo., May 21.—(AP)—Ambitions more audacious than the New York to Paris flight, are cherished by Captain Charles A. Lindbergh, who has planned to be the first man to fly from the United States to Australia. It was said here last night by Harry A. Knight, one of the backers of the youthful air mail pilot. First, however, Lindbergh planned to return here and attempt to break the endurance record, Knight said.

The Australian flight, Knight pointed out, would carry the flier over more than 6551 miles. He would cross the equator and fly over many groups of the South Sea Islands if the project were attempted. As Lindbergh planned it, the flight across the broadest of waters, the Pacific ocean, would be made in two hops, the first from the United States to Hawaii and the second from Honolulu to the western coast of Australia, slightly above Sydney.

M'KAY LAKE TO BE STOCKED

Portland, Ore., May 21.—(AP)—McKay lake in Umatilla county, is to be stocked with bass, croppies, catfish and sunfish, M. L. Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries, announced today following his return last night with State Game Warden Harold Clifford, from eastern Oregon. The work of stocking the lake will start in June. Ryckman said this would assure Umatilla county a fine fishing lake. Some work at the Union hatcheries, including addition of ponds, was decided upon. Game Warden Clifford said today that the commission at its last meeting ordered the opening of the following streams that had been closed: In Umatilla county, North and South forks McKay creek; North and South forks Umatilla river; North and South Forks Meacham creek. Lane county: Hills creek, commonly known as Kitson creek.

40 STUDENTS AT CHEMAWA ENTER TRAINING CAMP

Chemawa, Ore., May 21.—Forty Indian students have signed to attend the citizens' military training camp at Vancouver, Wash., this summer, according to an announcement issued at the school. All of those signed have taken medical examinations and have been given a clean bill. Captain Jean K. Stacey, senior instructor here, is prominent in the promotion work.

The Chemawa students will be supervised by sons of two superintendents of Indian schools and it is believed that they will take an unusual interest. Lieutenant William Goodman, son of C. W. Goodman, former superintendent of the Phoenix, Ariz., Indian school, will be one of the officers. Lieutenant Harold Royce, son of Superintendent Royce of the Carson, Nev., Indian school, and Lieutenant Van Way, a graduate of West Point and a schoolmate of Royce and Goodman, will be the other officers.

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
