

THROUGH CROWDS CHEMAWA HALL FOR OPERETTA

Chemawa, Or., June 1.—Declared to be a triumph success by everyone of the estimated thousands of 1500 people who crammed and jammed their way into the Salem Indian school auditorium here last night, the Mexican operetta, "Pepita," was presented to the public for the first night's showing. Hundreds of people were unable to find seats and had to take their choice of perching on a window sill or waiting for more favorable conditions, which are expected for tonight's second and final showing for visitors.

The players lived up to advance predictions and went through their lines with unusual clearness and did justice to many veteran actors. Edna Audette, as Felipa, daughter of the innkeeper; Louis DuPuis, as the valet; Henry Hopworth, as the millionaire; Raymond Haldane, as the millionaire; and Maybelle Bremner, his sister, were the hits of the evening. Their clever and humorous acting brought them to the limelight time and time again and overshadowed the work of the others.

Edna Audette and Louis DuPuis, however, were the real stars. Willson, the valet, played by DuPuis, was especially clever with his desire to win the hand of his mistress, the millionaire's sister, who was too romantic to even pay attention to him.

Work in the Indian suite of four scenes and the annual fashion show was also commendable. All of the participants carrying their parts with real ability. The costumes worn by the girls in the fashion display and made in the domestic art department of the school were especially striking.

Although it is thought that a large crowd will attend tonight's final showing to the public there will probably be plenty of seats for everyone and those who were unfortunately unable to secure seats last night will likely find room this evening. However, to be on the safe side it would be advisable to come early.

Yesterday afternoon folk dances by the students, a new event on the commencement week program, were given on the campus and all of the numbers were enjoyed. Sallor's hornpipe, Highland fling, mountain dances, folk dance by small boys and girls, and club drill were the events on the program.

In the morning the alumni meeting was held in the school auditorium, Henry Scade, one of the original 18 students, representing the alumni association, made the principal address.

This morning the industrial departments of the school were thrown open for public inspection and several hundred visitors went through the various details of the school work.

Tonight the Chemawa Indian school band will give a band concert in front of the school building, followed by the second night's presentation to the public of the operetta. The band concert will be given at 6 o'clock and the operetta at 8.

Tomorrow the program includes many events of local interest. The interclass track and field meet in the morning and the graduation exercises in the evening. The graduation presentation will be made by Dean H. D. Sheldon, dean of education at the University of Oregon. Dean Sheldon will make the principal address.

Friday morning the alumni picnic will be held in the woods near the campus, followed by the annual jolly-up program in the auditorium. At this time athletes who starred in their branches of athletics, best student, etc., will be awarded prizes. Tonight and tomorrow's program follows:

WILL FUNERAL HELD TUESDAY FROM HUBBARD

Hubbard, June 1.—The funeral of Charles M. Will, who was accidentally killed by falling from a high fir tree which he was topping, was held on Tuesday afternoon, an immense throng attending. Relatives from Salem and Portland as well as friends from all over the state were in attendance.

The eulogy was given by Oscar Paine, an old friend of Charles. Music was by a choir of friends, Mrs. Ella Stauffer, Avon Jesse, J. Wainwig and Mrs. Irwin, with Mrs. Wainwig at the piano.

At the cemetery the concluding services were given by the Knights of Pythias which service was followed by a procession of taps by an American Legion band. The flowers were profuse and beautiful.

Charles M. Will was the son of John William Will and May Wier Will, died at the J. Wier home place at Hubbard at the age of 34 years, 19 days and leaves his father, George J. Wier, his twin brother, Clark M. Will, and brothers, John William Will of San Jose, Cal., Enoch I. Will of Los Angeles, Cal., E. S. Wier of Hubbard, Ore., and sisters Mrs. Robert Mantell of Los Angeles, Mrs. L. M. Scholl and Miss Henrietta Wier of Hubbard and many other relatives and close friends.

He was a member of Arion Lodge, No. 57, Knights of Pythias at Hubbard for the last thirteen years of his life. Early in his school career he showed great interest in science and eagerly sought after recognized achievements of the world's masters of science. He became a student of aeronautics, astronomy and radio, specializing in the latter. His application and success at home gained early recognition from the national government and he was appointed radio instructor at Camp Lewis during the World War. He was also made a corporal in the 1st U. S. Infantry, feeling it an honor to belong to the oldest company of organized infantry in the regular army.

During this time his patience and perseverance aided him in setting new high records in career pigeon work. After the war he was sent on a state wide lecture tour in Washington talking radio and carrier pigeon in the interest of the recruiting department. After receiving his release from service, he worked in the Puget Sound Navy yard at Bremerton, Washington, in the radio laboratory till he was called home during the last illness of a beloved fostermother. After that he again went into radio serving as one of the laboratory force of the Sherman-Clay company, of Portland, Ore. The closing chapter of his short life was spent at home.

DEATH CLAIMS ANOTHER STATE PIONEER WOMAN

Gates, June 1.—Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Ellen Ritter Leedy, for many years a resident of Gates, were held on Thursday afternoon at Lebanon, Oregon.

Mrs. Leedy was born February 14, 1849 at South Bend, Indiana, and died in Corvallis, Oregon, May 24, 1927.

With her parents Mrs. Leedy crossed the plains from Indiana to Oregon in 1852, and lived for many years on the Ritter donation land claim near Lebanon.

On November 19, 1873, she was married to John Leedy, a pioneer mill and lumberman of Linn and Marion counties. After retiring from active lumber interests the family moved to Pendleton, Oregon, where Mr. Leedy died in 1917. Since then Mrs. Leedy has made her home with a daughter in Corvallis.

Surviving are four daughters, Mrs. T. L. Ball, Astoria, Ore.; Mrs. George Ransier, Pendleton, Ore.; Mrs. Enos Sherkey, Ashland, Ore.; Mrs. J. R. Agee, Corvallis, Ore.; and two sons, A. R. Leedy, Gates, Ore.; R. D. Leedy, Pendleton, Ore. There are also twelve grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

The work was done by Dr. V. A. Douglas of Salem, assisted by Mrs. H. Overton, Mrs. W. F. Norman and Mrs. Helen Guisa. This makes a total of 246 pupils of the Woodburn schools who have received the three necessary toxin anti-toxin treatments for immunity from diphtheria.

SCADE ATTENDED OLD INDIAN SCHOOL

Chemawa, Ore., June 1.—Henry Scade, one of the original 18 students who attended the first Indian school of the northwest at Forest Grove, where the school which is now called the Salem Indian school was first started, is representing the Alumni Association here as part of the commencement week exercises.

Mr. Scade, a retired farmer with huge assets, is one of the biggest business men in Tacoma, Wash., where he resides. He is trustee of several large estates, has been a committee member of the republican party for 34 years, a member of the Washington school board for years and generally interested in all educational lines.

He attended the school at Forest Grove for three years, which was started by Captain Wilkins, who was later killed by a member of the race who he had been interested in advancing. He later worked his way through Pacific university. He has eight children, several who have finished high school in Pierce county, Washington, and others who will eventually do so. He also has a daughter, who is completing her junior year in the University of Washington.

Last year Mr. Scade resigned from his duties on the school board, other interests demanding his entire time. Mrs. Josephine Corliss Preston, who spoke here this year and who is superintendent of Public Instruction in the state of Washington, appointed him as an honorary member of the board in observance of his long years of service.

"I went to the Indian schools and learned all that I could, later finishing at Pacific University. I am a great believer of the public school system, though the government is doing great work for the Indians and the present generation is better taken care of than we were. However, I think that the Indian race has advanced to such a stage that they are capable of going out on their own."
