Alaska-Mexico Skyline Trail Jaunt Resumed

MILL CITY, June 6.—Pete Parsons of this city, leaving today for a continuation of his hiking tour from Mexico to Alaska. Parsons, a picturesque character and a woodsman of the first degree, started his hiking on this trip several years ago and estimates that he had traveled 2,500 miles thus far, which includes through the deserts of California and over the wildest possible mountain country further north. He follows no trails, usually endeavoring to follow the backbone of mountain ranges, travels alone and depends greatly on the country for his supplies. Last summer he left off at the southern headwaters of the Peace River, in British Columbia, having followed the Rocky Mountains that far, and figures that he will travel 300 miles this summer over country that is practically unexplored, being nothing but a blank space on the map, does not expect to see any other person for at least two months, and as usual, will depend on his rifle for food.

He carries a pack weighing about 60 pounds when he starts out, which includes a camera, sleeping bag and blankets. The country he will travel this year is one of the wildest sections of the Rocky Mountains, and is abundant with game, both large and small. He will probably winter northeast of Fort Graham, and continue on north next summer. He has a wonderful collection of photographs that he has snapped during his travels.
