VACANT CHAIRS WOODBURN CITY COUNCIL FILLED

Woodburn, Or., June 8.—The first regular meeting of the city council since the death of Councilmen E. J. Forsythe and P. X. Bevk was held in the city hall last night and two vacant chairs were a reminder of the uncertainty of human life.

Following the roll call of officers and reading of the minutes the mayor declared nominations in order to fill the vacancy in ward 2, caused by the death of councilman E. J. Forsythe on May 14. James H. Lively was placed in nomination and unanimously elected. Mayor Broyles then called for nominations to fill the vacancy in ward 1, caused by the death of Councilman P. X. Bevk on May 26, and C. J. Epy was nominated and unanimously elected. The new councilmen were immediately sworn in by the recorder and assumed their duties.

Mayor Broyles welcomed the new incumbents and spoke of the loss sustained by the council in the death of two of its members. Mr. Epy and Mr. Lively responded in a fitting manner and expressed their willingness to serve the city to the best of their ability and to emulate the high standard set by their predecessors. Resolutions of condolence on the death of Councilmen Forsythe and Bevk were adopted and ordered spread upon the minutes.

A petition to grade and gravel Blaine street from Glitch street to the Pacific highway was read and referred to the streets committee to be reported upon at the next meeting. A request from Howitzer company for a refund of their dance license was granted.

An ordinance was passed designating the office of the city treasurer in the city hall and providing for the manner of identifying the same. Sidewalk was ordered in at the Johnson property on Fifth and Hay street and also across the fill on South Front street. The offer of M. L. Hendricks of \$50 for a quit claim deed to property along the slough on East Cleveland street was accepted. Bills for the month were examined and allowed and the council adjourned.

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THEO ORMBREK OF SILVERTON DIES TUESDAY

Silverton, June 8.—Theodore Ormbrek died at the Salem tuberculosis hospital Tuesday about noon after an illness of about one and one half years. He had spent most of the last year in the Milwaukee and Salem open air hospitals.

Mr. Ormbrek never fully recovered from a siege of smallpox he had nearly two years ago. Soon after, tuberculosis of the lungs and throat developed and recently attacked his spine and head.

Mr. Ormbrek was born in Arcadia, Wisconsin, 23 years ago next October. He moved with his parents to Ada, Minnesota, later and then to Silverton in 1920.

He leaves his mother of Silverton two sisters, Mrs. Earl Adams of Toledo and Mrs. Valberg of San Francisco; one brother, Elmer of Silverton; one half-sister, Mrs. Bartlett Lyons and one half-brother Elmer Johnson, both of Silverton. His father is also alive, but his whereabouts is not known.

Funeral services have not been arranged.

MARY ANN WHITE IS BURIED TODAY

Silverton, June 8.—Mrs. Mary Ann White died at her country home near Marquam on Monday morning at 11 o'clock after an illness of long standing. Mrs. White was hurt in an automobile accident some time ago from which she never fully recovered. She was troubled also with her heart and high blood pressure.

Mary Ann Birehet was born near Clatsop, Oregon, on December 1, 1883, and has lived in Oregon practically all of her life. On October 3, 1872 she was married to John R. Mr. White passed away in June, 1920.

Mrs. White will be buried Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Jack Ekman chapel. Reverend Bennett officiating, and he laid to rest in the Miller cemetery.
