Silverton, Or., July 1.—Company I, consisting of 58 men, three officers, Captain Henry Hutton, First Lieutenant Davenport, Second Lieutenant Sletton and Mascot "Doc" well, all happy and all in excellent condition.

It was proven that this company had forgotten none of the drills and formations that they had learned last year and in a number of cases they had advanced way beyond the expectations of the officers.
