

ROUTINE WORK TAKES TIME OF CITY COUNCIL

Woodburn, Or., July 6.—The regular council meeting was held last night and various minor affairs were acted upon. It was decided that the property owners on the east side of Gatch street be requested to repair their sidewalks and make them safe for pedestrians. The street committee reported that the Blaine street property owners had decided to gravel their street in a satisfactory manner at their own expense. A resolution was passed to authorize the mayor and recorder to issue a quit claim deed to M. L. Hendricks and wife for property along the slough on Cleveland street upon payment of \$60.

A request was made by the Ray-Brown cannery that the city give them fire protection by authorizing the fire company to protect the cannery in case of fire. This was left for decision later after a conference with the city attorney as to the legality of passing such an ordinance. It was also suggested that the fire chief request the cannery to change their new whistle, which sounds very much like the fire siren and is confusing to those who are not familiar with it.

The water superintendent was ordered to shut off the water on the premises of three delinquent water users. Bridges and culverts on Brown street and Ogle street were discussed and left for investigation by the street committee, and this committee was also requested to look into the traffic problem and to offer suggestions regarding stop signs at the next meeting.

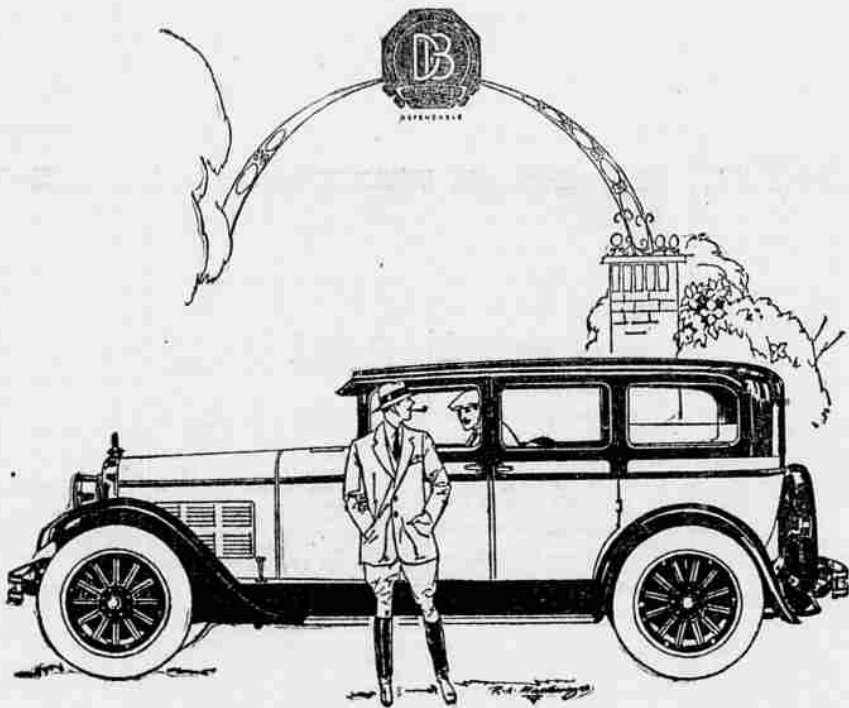
