

AUTO CRASHES OVER HOLIDAY MAY BE FATAL

Woodburn, July 7.—Mrs. O. H. Kastilahn, of 1056 Mathieson Place, Portland, who was seriously injured on July 3rd on the Molalla highway, is a sister of Frank Wright of this city, and resided in Woodburn during her childhood. She will be remembered as Miss Ethel Wright, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Wright.

The car in which Mrs. Kastilahn and her husband were riding accompanied by three other persons, attempted to pass a stage, which refused to give the right of way, and the car either caught on the stage or skidded on the edge of the pavement and turned over twice. Mrs. Kastilahn suffered a broken back and her neck was thrown out of joint. She is now lying in a very serious condition at the Good Samaritan hospital with slight chance of recovery. The other occupants received only minor injuries.

Donald, July 7.—Two car smash-ups came to local residents during the holiday celebration. Saturday evening Walt Ballard's Ford was overturned in the ditch just east of here, caused by a tire coming off. Ballard and Don Epper, who was with him, crawled from the car, which stood on its wheels still running. The only injury was to the top of the car.

Bill Long and Charles Fowler were both injured when their car skidded and turned over, rolling down the bank of the Abiquia river, about 18 miles from Silverton. The accident happened Sunday evening about 8 o'clock as they were returning from a day's fishing.

In the car with the men were five children, Florence and James Long; William, Margaret and Florence Fowler, who escaped with slight scratches and bruises.
