

BABY PHEASANT SHIPMENTS ARE GETTING READY

Silverton, July 8.—Carl Benson, owner and manager of the large China pheasant farm two miles northwest of Silverton, states that he has more than 4000 young birds and is now beginning to ship them expecting to ship the last lots about October 10.

All of these young birds will be sent to Montana, Texas, Pennsylvania and Oklahoma. They are shipped in crates of from 12 to 14 in each crate, according to the distance they must travel and are from 10 to 12 weeks old when shipped. Mr. Benson has these crates especially made and equipped for feeding, air and cleanliness. Crates going the shorter distances are returned, but those going across the continent are not.

Benson is a nephew of Simon Benson, the financier, who until a short time ago lived in Portland and who donated much to that city. He was here visiting the Carl Benson family a few weeks ago.

Hewitt is past 72 years old and this is a severe shock at his age. He will be confined in bed for a week or 10 days. His son, C. W. Hewitt of Turner and his brother, Dr. L. L. Hewitt of Portland, were hastily summoned to his bedside.

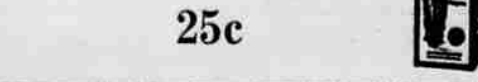

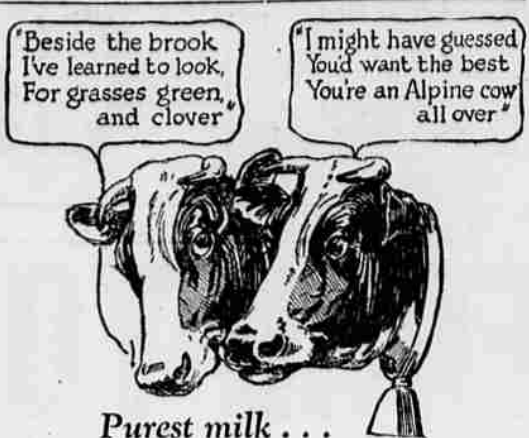
