

MORLEY RITES IN AFTERNOON AT SILVERTON

Silverton, July 21.—Funeral services were held from the Jack & Ekman parlors at 2 o'clock this afternoon for George Morley, pioneer Marion county resident, who died at Klamath Falls, Tuesday morning while on a hunting and fishing trip. Rev. Bennett officiated with graveside ceremonies at the Miller cemetery in charge of the Knights of Pythias.

Morley was the eldest of 16 children born to John and Selah Morley, an early Oregon pioneer family, and was born December 8, 1856 at Union Hill, near Sublimity. He moved to Silverton with his family when eight years old, the father purchasing what is now known as the Thomas Saithe place on South Water street. All his life was spent within a few miles of Silverton.

In 1886 he purchased a farm on the Abiqua and was one of the first hop growers in the state, being in this business for nearly 30 years. He was married to Marie Shepard, daughter of the pioneer Shepard family living near McKee, in 1877. His wife died in 1918. In 1912 Morley bought a place in Silverton in the same block in which he was born. Morley was a member of the W. O. W. and K. P. lodges.

Surviving are three children, Frank and Jay Morley and Mrs. Carl Haberly, all of Silverton; three grand children, three brothers, Roy, John and Charles, all of Silverton; six sisters, Mrs. Rose Shiplock, Mrs. Effie Hicks, Mrs. Ella McCleary, Mrs. Alice Jack and Mrs. Mary Warnock, all of Silverton, and Mrs. Iva Mitchell of Salem. Another son died in infancy.
