SENATORS WIN FROM WOODMEN SCORE 8 TO 3

The fact that W. O. FIRST BOY BORN IN SALEM PASSES AT 85

Portland, Aug. 1.—George P. Holman, the first white male child born in Salem, Ore. died last Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. T. W. B. London, at Vancouver, B. C. according to word received here. He was born in Salem February 6, 1842. His father, Joseph Holman, was born in England in 1815 and came to United States in 1834. He was a carpenter by trade and joined the Peoria wagon train in 1839, arriving in Salem in the spring of 1840. He was married to Miss Almira Phelps early in 1841.

George Holman received his early education at Wilamette university and graduated from the Ohio Wesleyan university with the class of June, 1866. He then took a course in law at Albany, N. Y., and upon motion of John H. Mitchell was admitted to the bar of the state. He was the first native son to be admitted to the practice of law in this state. In 1868 he was elected to the legislature, the first native son to serve in that capacity.

On June 1, 1869, he was married to Miss Ruth Rounds of Salem. He turned from the practice of law to the lumber business, and after residing in Salem for a number of years moved to Salt Lake City in 1892. He retired from the wholesaler lumber business five years ago, following the death of his wife. Mr. Holman has considerable business interests in Salt Lake City and amassed quite a fortune during his years of activity there. The daughter, at whose home he died, is the only surviving relative.
