

SPECIAL BOND ELECTION FOR HUBBARD LOST

Hubbard, Aug. 6.—The special bond election authorized by the Hubbard school board and held at the school house Thursday from 2 to 7 o'clock drew out many of those whose names are on the tax rolls of 1926. While former school elections called out a mere handful this time 123 votes were cast; 9 for the issuing of the bonds to build another school house and 122 against with three defective votes.

The judges elected to serve at this time were M. B. Kester, Waldo Brown, and Mrs. A. M. de Lempine, while B. H. Paulsen was elected as clerk. The town folks residing within walking distance of the school were a minority to the men and women who live further out in the district, and judging by the large majority of the "no's" additional taxes even for educational purposes are not desired by the community.

This leaves the Hubbard situation as it was before, with too many pupils for the amount of space. The school board, Waldo Chairman, George Leffler and A. F. de Lempine are cogitating ways and means to cover this space shortage.

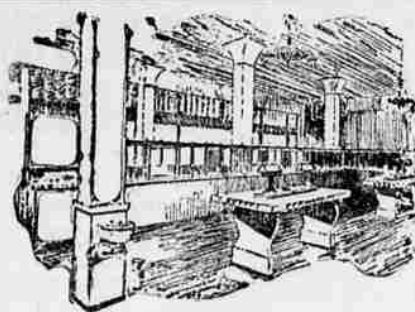

Rosedale, Aug. 6.—Mrs. Lester Bates of Albany, a former resident of this district, is visiting with friends.



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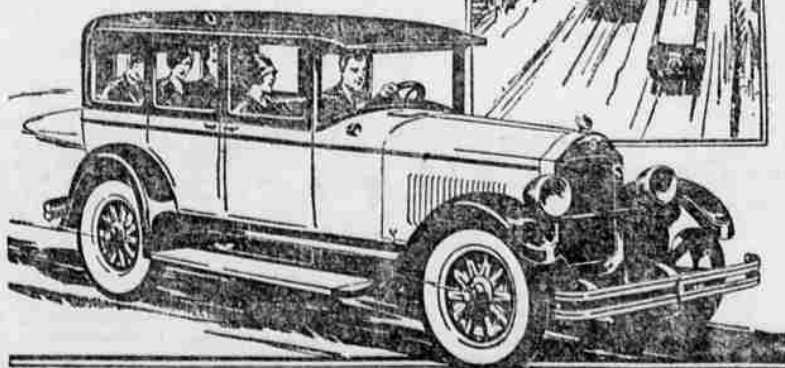
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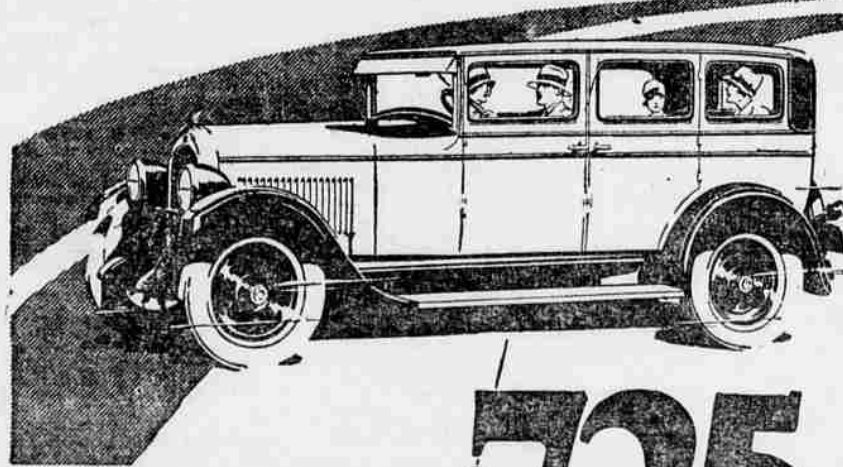
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
