

ABIQUA WATERS MUCH ENJOYED DURING WARMTH

Mt. Angel, Aug. 8.—The most popular spot in Mt. Angel during these hot days and evenings is "the old swimming hole" on Abiqua creek, where at least fifty or more people go every night to splash and gurgles to their hearts content.

Doctor, lawyer, merchant and farmer—everybody is becoming a steadfast devotee of the art of swimming, and defy the worst efforts of old Sol.

Two spring-boards satisfy the desires of the more ambitious swimmers, while a comfortable sun-bath and temporary beach attract many others. This place is situated about a mile and a half south of Mt. Angel. The swimming hole is large and clean, and depths found to suit everybody. According to Bert Busch, August Scharbach, Joe Kasper, and other prominent citizens who have frequented the creek, by the end of the week, if the weather does not break, there will be two hundred and fifty people at the resort every night. Fear has been expressed, however, that someone with selfish, monetary interests will assume control of the new-found resort for commercial purposes. In this case, it is said, an appeal will be made to Don Upjohn or some other power in the Capital City for assistance in reserving this utility for the common people. In the meantime, men, women and children continue to throng about the creek and cool off in Abiqua water.
