

SCHOOL OPENS FOR WOODBURN PUPILS MONDAY

Woodburn, Sept. 13.—Woodburn school opened yesterday with an enrollment of 251 at the high school and 255 in the grade schools. About 30 or 40 more students are expected to enter high school the first of next week which will bring the total enrollment very near to the 500 mark. The registration shows 45 seniors, 58 juniors, 67 sophomores, and 81 freshmen.

WOMAN IN AUTO FINDS IT HOT IN ARTIC RING

London—(P)—The Honorable Mrs. Victor Bruce complained of suffering from a heat wave in the Arctic circle during her recent automobile jaunt toward the North Pole.

She has returned to London to tell of adventures which include a race from forest fire in Sweden, terrors by mosquitoes and suffering from Polar heat.

Altogether she travelled 6000 miles, crossed Belgium, Holland, Germany, Denmark, Lapland, Finland, averaging 210 miles a day. She was accompanied by her husband, the son of Lord Aberdeen, and Robert W. Beare.

"We went with plenty of thick coats prepared for freezing weather," she said, "but all the time we were in the Arctic zone the temperature was never lower than 20 degrees in the shade. We wanted to reach the Arctic Ocean. Within forty miles of it we struck marshes, but we pushed forward, almost inch by inch, for three miles.

"We encountered a terrible storm in Sweden, and the lightning set fire to the forest. It meant a race for life over fearful roads.

"Some days I was fifteen hours at the wheel. On many occasions we drove by the light of the midnight sun."
