

CALIFORNIA FAVORED TO BEAT OREGON

BETTING GIVES BEARS EDGE IN SATURDAY GAME

Portland, Oct. 13. (Special)—Betting odds on the outcome of the game here Saturday between the University of Oregon and University of California eleven were ranging from 10-to-7 to 2-to-1 on the southerners, and on the basis of points the Bears were rated as being from 6 to 13 points stronger than the Webfoots.

California's victory last week over the strong St. Mary's eleven, which the week before trounced Stanford 16 to 0, was the strongest factor in placing the visitors on the long end of the betting odds, and there have so far been few wagers placed on any basis.

Advices from Berkeley are that the Bears have knocked off on their heavy training for the battle and that Coach Nils Price is loading 35 of his huskies onto the rattler this afternoon for the northbound trip Oregon, on the other hand, is going through a stiff final practice this afternoon to put the finishing touches on the aggregation that is to attempt to hold or defeat the Californians.

The dope sheet on the opposing players offers little to favor either team. Both will have strong defensive lines, well-balanced and shifty backfields, and both are being drilled in open field tactics. A dry field Saturday should assure some of the fastest football that will be seen on the Pacific coast this fall.

DOROTHY LOGAN GETS \$5,000 FOR CHANNEL SWIM

London, Oct. 13. (AP)—Dr. Dorothy Logan was handed a check for \$5,000 today as a prize for lowering Gertrude Ederle's channel swim time.

Paris, Oct. 13. (AP)—Skepticism in the French press regarding the record-breaking channel swim of Dr. Dorothy Logan (Mona McLellan) of London is countered by a dispatch to Le Matin from Boulogne saying investigation has shown that she started from Cape Gris Nez as claimed.

A man from the semaphore station on the cape, strolling on the cliffs while off duty, saw the swimmer start, the dispatch says and the boat which accompanied her was sighted by the lighthouse keeper, a hotel man and by Ishak Helmy, the Egyptian swimmer.

Dr. Logan and her trainer, Horace Carey, have sworn to affidavits in London, regarding her claim of crossing the channel in 13 hours 10 minutes, and Carey declared the swimmer would receive the prize of 1000 pounds sterling offered by Lord Riddell for the first British woman to break Gertrude Ederle's record of 14 hours 31 minutes.

GERMAN ATHLETES CUT BEER DRINKING

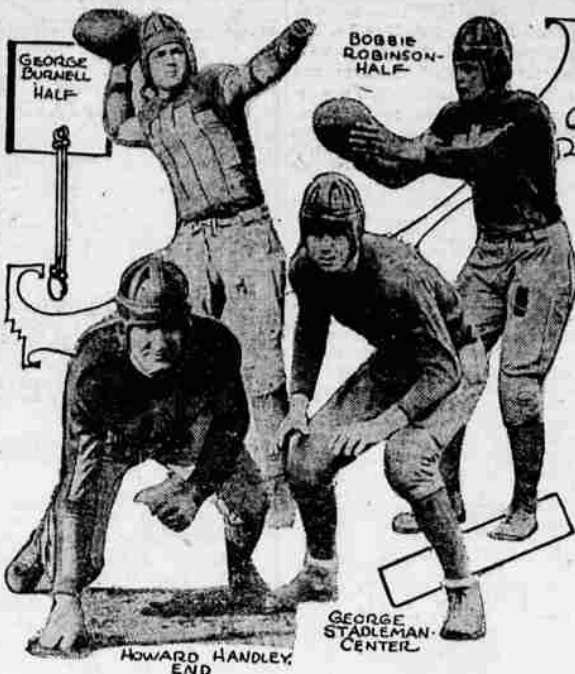
Berlin (AP)—Athletics, the "dry" movement and economic necessity have reduced the consumption of beer in Germany by one-fourth as compared with 1913, according to figures compiled by the federal statistical bureau.

Before the war, the average consumption of beer per person per year was 27 gallons. At this average figure includes children and the very aged, it is safe to say that the average consumption of the beer-consuming German was at least 50 gallons. Today, the average consumption is only 20 gallons per head per year.

Only half of one per cent of this is imported beer, such as Pilsen, porter, and ale. The 99 per cent is manufactured right in Germany.

The strength of the University of Oregon eleven, which will play the California team in the Multnomah stadium, Portland, Saturday will be chiefly in these four players. George Burnell, halfback, is fast and elusive. Bobbie Robinson, another fleet halfback, is an expert ball carrier and an outstanding man on defense, and is the Webfoot punter. Howard Handley, end, is one of the strongest wingmen on the squad. George Stadler, center, weighs 200 pounds, is a sure passer, and indispensable on defense as a roving center.

MAINSTAYS OF INDIAN TEAM ON HOSPITAL LIST

Chemawa, Oct. 13. (Special)—The Chemawa Indians are printing for their most important game of the season to be played Friday against Columbia university at Portland, Friday.

Losses of important players by injuries, drops and failures have placed Coaches Downie and Bent in a predicament but they expect to show a strong aggregation. Bruno, tackle, was dismissed from the squad and will be replaced by Roy Peratrovitch, regular guard. Either Isaac Turley or Ed Walker will be used at left guard in place of Peratrovitch.

Pratt is in Klamath Falls on a visit and Roush, center, has an injured back. The coaching staff hopes to have Sol Fleury in shape for his usual strong exhibition at halfback. He suffered a badly bruised foot during the game with the Willamette super-varsity last Saturday, and has not been in practice since this week.

The coming game between two traditional rivals of almost equal strength should be a close struggle in the opinion of Chemawa coaches. Columbia received a drubbing last week from Linfield college, while the Indians have won two straight. Franklin high, 13 to 6, and the Willamette Super-varsity, 13 to 0. In 1925 the teams tied 12 to 12 and last year Coach Downie's warriors went down 7 to 6. It is this latter defeat that the young chiefs

aim to remedy. The starting Chemawa line will average 185 pounds and the backfield, 185 pounds, a well balanced team in nearly every respect.

Billy Townsend, Vancouver, and Johnny Woods, Seattle, "stole the show" when they put on six rounds of "wildfire" fighting in the semi-final. Townsend was given a very close decision.

BAN JOHNSON READY TO QUIT LEAGUE POST

Chicago, Oct. 13. (AP)—His "house in order," Ban Johnson, stormy petrel of organized baseball is ready to turn over the keys of his 37 year old office of president of the American league next Monday, or 15 days before he had originally planned.

Johnson gave no reason for his decision to speed up his resignation, his parting message dwelling entirely on the future of baseball.

On Monday, the board of directors of the league, Frank J. Navin of Detroit; Clark Griffith of Washington; Phil Ball of St. Louis and Ben Shibe of Philadelphia, will meet with Johnson, at his call, to receive his formal resignation, to look over his records and possibly to choose his successor.

While no announcement of the probable candidates has been made, baseball writers are almost unanimous in their guess that it will be E. S. Barnard, president of the Cleveland club.

"I am turning over the office in such shape that a child could read its history," President Johnson said. "My successor, whoever he may be will have no trouble. I hope my successor will be a strong man for the good of the league. Without one the league can easily go on the rocks. Factions form in all groups and one man must dominate all factions and have real authority. A rubber stamp president will be a

mistake. He must rule with an iron hand without regard for friendship or factions."

He also warned that the game "must be kept free from taint, away from gambling and syndicating."

BAN JOHNSON ENDS REIGN NEXT WEEK

Chicago, Oct. 13. (AP)—President Ban Johnson of the American league is ready to leave the office he has held for 34 years.

Johnson last night announced he had called a meeting of the directors of the American league for next Monday and that at that time he would step out of office. Johnson resigned several months ago but no date for it to become effective was set.

Johnson will leave a stormy baseball career which started in 1893 when he was elected president of the Western league. He became president of an organization which actually did not exist but before spring of 1894 he had perfected a league.

In 1893, Johnson and other officials of the league decided to expand and changed the name to the American league. Two years later a fight was started with the National league to establish right to major league classification.

The American league clubs bought players from the other leagues and in a short time a truce was arranged which resulted in the American league being placed on an equal basis with the National.

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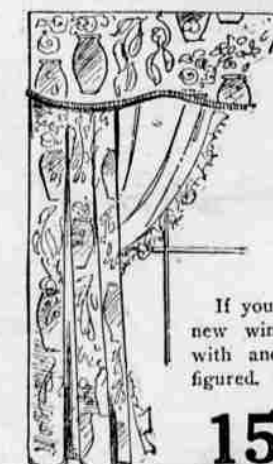
