

## DUVALL HANGS ON MAYORALTY DESPITE COURT

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 13. (AP)—Although formally sentenced to 30 days in jail, fined \$1000 and disbarred from public office for four years from November 2, 1925, for violation of the corrupt practices act, Mayor John L. Duvall still held his office today insisting he would continue to do so until the state supreme court ruled on his appeal from conviction. Special Judge Cassius C. Shirley overruled a motion for a new trial.

Duvall was liberated on a \$2000 bond. He was convicted by a jury on September 22 of having promised William H. Armitage, local politician the privilege of naming three city officials for \$10,000 and Armitage's support in the mayoralty campaign. Formal sentencing of the mayor yesterday was expected to bring to a climax demands by various civic and business organizations that Mayor Duvall resign. Attorneys were divided as to whether Duvall's appeal held in abeyance the four year disability to hold office. Prosecutor William H. Remy declared that the mayor is holding his office illegally. He will confer with his assistants on action to be taken relative to Duvall's removal. No immediate decision was expected.

To The Editor: Now the time is near when the bird season will open for another two weeks, and hunters and sportsmen are being prepared for pleasant and grouse.

In this connection a word to hunters may not be amiss. The following is the result of a number of years' observation in the hunting field:

A majority of the land is today posted against trespass, this applying especially to the man with a shotgun. It is not pleasant, I'll admit, but it is a sad fact to have to admit that the sportsman has brought this condition about to a large degree. The rancher owns or leases the land, raises the grain that feeds the pheasants and grouse, keeps the fences up, and pays the taxes on the property. Then, at crack of dawn on the first morning the hunting season opens, sundry hunters invade his fields, run over them regardless of whatever may be there, leave gates open; in some cases let down fences to let dogs through, sting or even fatally injure his stock with shot, and in general make things very unpleasant for the property owner.

## DUVALL SENTENCED TO 30 DAYS JAIL

Attorneys for the mayor announced an appeal would be taken to the Indiana supreme court.

## BEND BARBERS ON STRIKE AGAINST CUT

Bend, Ore., Oct. 13. (UP)—Journeymen barbers walked out here today as the result of a decision of master barbers to lower the price of haircuts for women and children from 75 cents to 50 cents, with a consequent reduction in journeymen's wages. The walkout was complete, only master barbers remaining at work in the eight shops here.

Master barbers were to meet this afternoon to consider demands of the journeymen. Neither side would make any statement.

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## SECOND RECALL STIRS RAINIER

Longview, Wash., Oct. 13. (AP)—A movement for a second recall election at Rainier, Ore., within two months, was under way there today with the circulation of petitions proposing recall of Mrs. Florence Bowen, president of the city council and mayor pro tem and M. W. Brown, councilman.

A. E. Veatch, editor of the Rainier Review, was recalled as mayor, and Ed Haugeberg as council at a spirited election August 15.

Since that time no council meeting has been held, due to inability to muster a quorum. C. C. Clark and Mrs. A. M. Lee have not attended a meeting since the recall election. They are anti-Veatch while Mrs. Bowen, Brown and S. M. Rice, who was appointed to fill the vacancy of Councilman Veatch, are Veatch sympathizers. The Veatch element has control of the council.

## SYSTEM OF PENSIONS RAPPED BY DEAN INGE

London (AP)—Dean Inge of St. Paul's thinks the new idea poor supported on the dole threaten to be a greater menace to Great Britain than the idle rich of the past. "A new parasite class is being created," writes Dean Inge in The Evening Standard. "The dole is the most mischievous and ruinous device for buying off revolution which was ever invented. It was resorted to after the Napoleonic wars in the form of outdoor relief out of the rates. And the burdens on the land became so intolerable that farmers began to throw up their farms. At that time the receivers of the dole had no vote and the government had the courage to bring the pernicious system to a sudden end. Now, no government would dare do anything of the kind."

## PLUS-FOURS BLAMED TO LOOSE CONDUCT

London (AP)—Wives who have difficulty in making their husbands' eyes behave would do well to keep them out of golf knickerbockers, if President Weddell of the National Federation of Merchant Tailors may be believed.

"A man in plus fours is more lax in conduct than a man in morning coat, and the wearing of a dress suit encourages gentler and more civilized conduct," says Mr. Weddell. But this great authority on male attire is all against the dinner coat. He says fat men like it because they do not look so ridiculous in it as they do in long-tailed evening coats, but he warns that it is almost negligible and is such an informal sort of garment that no man can appear genteel when wearing it.

## PARALYSIS CASES SHOW AN INCREASE

Washington, Oct. 13. (AP)—An increase in infantile paralysis cases, centered largely in Massachusetts, New York and other northern states, was noted in reports for the week ending October 8, which were compiled today by the public health service. The flare-up of the disease in that section overcame a decline in the midwest and the Pacific coast areas, raising the total number of cases in the country to 650 compared with 635 for the preceding seven days.

Increases were shown in Arizona which had five cases against one, and Utah, with four against two. California showed a decrease from 46 to 36 cases, and Oregon from 30 to 18.

## CARUSO'S WIDOW TO WED MOORE

New York, Oct. 13. (AP)—Mrs. Dorothy Benjamin Caruso Ingram, widow of the famous tenor, today confirmed reports of her betrothal to Alexander P. Moore, former ambassador to Spain, and husband of the late Lillian Russell. She said they plan to be married in January, 1928.

Mrs. Ingram was married to Ernest Augustus Ingram after the death of Caruso and they were divorced later.

## PEDESTRIANS KINGS ON GERMAN STREETS

Berlin (AP)—American travelers coming to Berlin from Paris in their touring cars declare that the most difficult city in Germany for a chauffeur is Cologne.

The pedestrian, they say, is absolute monarch of the streets. It is impossible for an automobile to drive through the streets of the in-

ner city even at moderate speed, because pedestrians will listen to no siren or horn, but calmly proceed in the middle of the street until it suits the convenience to turn aside. "It is enough to drive any chauffeur crazy," tourists declare.
